CONSERVATION MATTERS

The Changing Face of Sportfishing - My friend Bob Rees shares his experiences as a saltwater fishing guide and seeing opportunity wane and concludes we are at a crossroads, with no real roadmap to righting the listing vessel. Challenges to sportfishing resources are coming at us from all angles. From lethal summer water temperatures on our public forestlands, to the collapse of the food base for critical marine species, to unknown changes in ocean temperatures and acidification, we have a lot to fix. Staving off change is already too late; we need methods and strategies to reverse the damage we've done, and it only comes from collaboration. He concludes "If we continue to have such rare opportunity to enjoy such a unique resource, these special days become even more meaningful. It also means, however, that fewer people will get a chance to enjoy them, compromising the future foot soldiers we need to keep the dream alive."

Capturing Carbon with Seaweed: What We Know, What We Don't, and What We're Totally Unsure About - In the world of carbon offset trading, kelp is a big buzzword. Golden-brown and glistening, certain seaweeds are catching the attention of investors for their seeming propensity to grab vast amounts of carbon and pack it away for the long haul. US Help Our Kelp Act aims to support kelp forest recovery efforts - We've read that kelp may help store carbon, but can it also be sustainably harvested. Grown on the Pacific Coast from California to Alaska and on the East Coast in parts of New England, kelp has been harvested on a large scale in the United States since World War I, when the vegetation was used as a source of potash to make gunpowder. Calif., NOAA taking urgent action in wake of chinook 'co-hort collapse' - For commercial fishers, losing gear is part of The California Department of Fish and Wildlife and National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration Fisheries biologists are pursuing urgent measures this fall to save some of the last remaining Central Valley spring-run Chinook salmon after the numbers returning from the ocean this year fell sharply toward extinction.

Biologists call this year's sharp decline a "cohort collapse" because so few threatened adult spring-run Chinook salmon returned to the small streams still accessible to them. Mill and Deer Creek — two of the three streams that hold the remaining independent spring-run populations — each saw fewer than 25 returning adults this year.



Surf Fishing 101

Planning/Scouting

Conditions

Tides/Moon Phase - lots of online tide charts - look at the spread between high and low tide, 3-5 ft. is good. Higher energy tides and surf usually mean higher current and more seaweed

Wind Windy.app to forecast less than 10 mph

WINDY.AP

Surf - Surfline app to forecast 0 - 2 ft. is best but time between waves is more important > 10 sec **Surfline**

Current – heavy current will push your bait on shore, change your set-up

Seaweed – the less the better, change locations or use heavier leader line

Contamination – after storms bacteria load is high, also red tide is a problem check water conditions

Terrain

Winter vs. Summer Beach Sand Bars, Troughs, Holes, Cuts, Rip Currents, Points

Target Fish Peak Season

Surf Perch September – May (Barred and Walleye)
(females are larger, live longer and pregnant
Nov. – May) Limit 10 of one species, 20 total
Croaker June – September (Yellowfin and Spotfin)
Limit 10
Corbina July – September 12" minimum, limit 2
Halibut June-October 22" minimum, limit 2


Equipment


Rods range from 7 to 10 feet depending on target fish, conditions, and terrain e.g. Carolina Rig – 6 to 8 ft. rod with med. to med, heavy power and mod. to mod.-fast action


Lure - 8 to 10 ft. rod with med. Heavy power and mod. – fast to fast action


Reels – saltwater 3000 to 4000 series is best but have used freshwater reels, must clean/oil them every trip

Line – 15# to 30# main line with 6# to 20# leader 2-4 feet. Set-ups (hooks, weights, swivels, beads)









Bait (live, plastics, lures, swim baits)

Live - Pregnant Sand crabs, mussel and clam meat, dried anchovies/shrimp

Plastics - Red/Green sandworms, oily sandcrab (jigging)

Lures – Luckycraft 110 or similar (jerkbait), use Powerclips to quickly change out lures

Swimbaits - use Texas rig with weighted hook

Dedicated to Fishing, Fun, Relaxation, and Companionship!

License optional 2nd pole stamp

Clothing – hat, sunglasses (polarized), sunscreen, water shoes

Needle nose pliers

Tape measure

Pack for gear, food, water, and fish storage

I use GamePlan Gear Spot-n-Stalk Quiver Pack (Left or Right Hand) keeps your casting arm free (my bowhunting pack). Sold out in most shops I checked. Currently on Ebay for \$75. There are several inexpensive sling-type fishing backpacks out there. The one below can be left-hand,

right-hand, or backpack.






Strategies/Tactics

Know the conditions and change your set-up to fit them

Try to scout during low tide and looking from the bluffs, but learn how to read the terrain from the beach during any tide

Fish where the fish are - cuts are fish highways. troughs, holes, foam, rip currents. Keep your eyes open and move from place to place, 3-4 casts and move on if not getting bit

Fan casting and using the current to drop in to the trough, cut, holes. I release about 90% of perch I catch Be an ambassador for the sport

The Betty O and National Marine Fisheries Service Working Together

The boat Betty O, of Marina Del Rey Sportfishing, is currently participating in an ongoing program to collect groundfish for study along with the National Marine Fisheries Service (NMFS). You would be familiar with the Betty O through the Club's Marine Mentor youth fishing trip each August and with the disabled veterans trips which run during the year.

The boat got involved in this groundfish study, known as the Cooperative Recreational Sampling Program, by way of an invitation extended to me by Merit McCrea in early September on behalf of NMFS and the Sportfishing Association of California, the support and lobbying organization of which the Betty O and Marina Del Rey Sportfishing are members. The Sportfishing Association of California (SAC) through its member landing representatives is devoted to maintaining fisheries access based on accurate and updated stock assessment.

In this program, which is a pilot program at this time, groundfish are sampled during the anglers' fish filleting by the boat crew on open party and private group charter trips. Groundfish for the sampling covers Scorpionfish and rockfish, and excludes Boccaccio and Chilipepper. It's an inherently good idea to sample the sport boats, as the flow of specimens for study is constant and the areas sampled range over a broad area and are disparate. The Betty O is one of twenty sport boats along the coast participating in this. The samples, which are limited to 2 species on a given trip, are taken from passengers' odd numbered gunny sacks, the aim being to further assure dispersal in the run of the samples. Fish to be filleted are done so in a procedure which leaves the body cavity intact: the knife enters from the dorsal fin and carves down and over the rib cage so that the guts, including the canal to the anus, remain attached to the skeleton. The carcasses (skeletons) of the filleted fish are subsequently put aside and at the end of fish cutting the crew measures and tags each individual carcass with a preprinted species tag, writing on the tag the length in centimeters and the date. The carcasses are then placed in a common bag with the day's date into the boat or landing's freezer. When the carcass count reaches fifty then the batch of packaged frozen specimens is ready for shipping out, to be picked up by UPS. They end up in a lab in Santa Cruz, CA, for analysis. By the way, I'm describing a cutting procedure which we do not generally observe on sport boats off our coast, where the cut starts as a forceful slash angling under the gill plate collar and strokes back through the rib cage to the tail, separating fillet, rib cage, and guts from the body. So our deck crew has had to make adjustments, as they were not familiar with the program's method of filleting at the onset of our participating.

The Betty O samples a variety of deep-water rockfish; she is allowed to fish for and keep rockfish only in waters deeper than 300 feet. The Scorpionfish included in the samples are drawn from waters of 80 to 180 feet. Our vets trips target Scorpionfish and inshore sand and kelp bass.

Rachel Brooks of NMFS is our biologist and contact person in this program.


MOVING FORWARD... LOOKING BACKWARDS

B ack in the 1990's one of the top sports boats in the fleet was the Bongos. The Bongos was owned and operated by Captain Joe Bairian. Captain Joe loved to fish for sharks, so we gave it a try. Nothing doing. Next stop Catalina Island. We had a great time fishing for Calicos, caught our limits and agreed to turn the boat around and head back to Newport Harbor.

About 15 minutes later, the boat abruptly stopped, Captain Joe jumped down to the deck and pinned two of our remaining anchovies to a size #14 hook, tossed it out and told me to get ready. Ready or not, the shark immediately grabbed the bait and took off. Line peeled off the Penn International like the 40-pound drag was set at five pounds.

I had never hooked a Mako before. This was one big, acrobatic fish.--The biggest he had ever caught at the time. It ran, it jumped. It ran some more. It jumped some more. Two hours later, the fight ended successfully (for me)---a 225- pound Mako Shark.


