## **CONSERVATION MATTERS**

To close out this year, I thought I'd focus on reasons to be cheerful and conservation successes witnessed this year. While many of us are mindful of the many challenges facing our oceans, there are many reasons to feel cheerful. This is a reminder to be curious about how the world can be better, and to ask ourselves how we can be part of that change.

The EU Just Banned Microplastics - Microplastics, solid plastic particles up to five millimeters in size that are not biodegradable — are pretty much everywhere. They have been detected in over 1,500 different marine animal species. A blue whale can ingest about 10 million pieces of microplastics per day. They also find their way into our bodies via the water cycle and the food chain. In fact, the average person consumes up to five grams of microplastics per week. That's as much as a credit card. In a move to stave off further damage, the European Union has now banned intentionally added microplastics.

This will lead to changes in the manufacture of diverse products including cosmetics, artificial turf and tires. When combined with ecodesign guidelines, the EU will tap into the greatest potential for reducing microplastics - not producing them in the first place. EPA to Investigate Tire Chemical Linked to West Coast Salmon Deaths - In the world of carbon offset trading, kelp is a The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) announced plans to review the use of, and consider prohibiting, the rubber preservative found in tires known as 6PPD, in response to a petition from the Yurok Tribe, the Port Gamble S'Klallam Tribe and the Puyallup Tribe of Indians. The chemical 6PPD is a rubber preservative used in tires as well as other applications, such as playground flooring, shoes and synthetic turf infill. It makes the rubber more durable, the EPA explained. However, tires and other objects can shed small particles containing this chemical. Once in the water, this chemical proves acutely toxic to in toxicity to aquatic life, especially salmois toxic to aquatic life aquatic life, including Chinook salmon, rainbow trout and steelhead trout.

"This is a victory for salmon and all species and people," the Puyallup Tribal Council said in a statement. "6PPD is a major and uniquely lethal threat to the health of salmon in urban streams on our reservation. Banning this chemical from tires will be hugely important in protecting fish. We thank the EPA for taking our concerns seriously. NOAA Fisheries Announce New Funding and Coordinated Action to Help Bring California Salmon Back from the Brink – More Than 40 Projects Planned - NOAA and its partners are implementing dozens of projects to benefit endangered Central California Coast coho salmon. An unprecedented \$27.8 million has been awarded to bring Central California Coast coho salmon back

to California rivers. NOAA designated CCC coho as a Species in the Spotlight a due to its high risk of extinction. Trout Unlimited, the San Mateo and told Ridge Resource Conservation Districts, and The Nature Conservancy will implement or design more than 40 projects over the next 3 to 4 years with these funds.

Blue Sharks Find the Spotlight - At the beginning of 2023, Oceana published a revealing study about the global catch of blue sharks estimated at more than seven million individuals. Blue shark make up a whopping 60% of all reported global shark catch and 36% of all traded shark meat. Forty-one percent of all traded shark fins come from blue sharks. The sheer volume of catch makes blue shark a high value industry. Oceana estimated the value of blue shark fisheries at \$411 million — which surpasses that of any of the prized bluefin tuna species served at high-end sushi joints. Despite this, international fishery organizations have few limits on blue sharks. The absence of comprehensive management procedures threatens the long-term sustainability for fishing and for maintaining populations at levels to perform their vital role in marine ecosystems.

This year, Wild Oceans joined several other ocean conservation organizations to call for the precautionary management of blue sharks. In the Atlantic, managers adopted new recommendations on total allowable catch and quota allocation for both the northern stock (30,000 mt) and southern stock (27,700 mt). While the limits don't reach the level of precaution and management needed, this is a step in the right direction and acknowledges the importance of managing the blue shark fishery for conservation.

Federal Action Opens Fishing Areas After a 20 Year Closure - In the early 2000s, large areas along the West Coast were set aside to promote the recovery of various species. The conservation areas allowed fish stocks inside their boundaries to rebuild, and act as nurseries for rockfish along the entire West Coast. Effective January 1, Amendment 32 to the Pacific Coast Groundfish Fishery Management Plan:

- Reopens part of the Non-Trawl Rockfish Conservation Area off California and Oregon, granting access to approximately 2,400 square miles of historically important fishing grounds that have been closed since 2002
- Removes Cowcod Conservation Area restrictions for non-trawl groundfish fisheries areas off southern California, opening roughly 4,600 square miles of historical fishing grounds to non-trawl groundfish commercial and recreational fisheries, previously closed since 2001
- Creates new closures to protect rebuilding yelloweye rockfish, groundfish essential fish habitat, and other sensitive areas, including

Millionth Spiny Superhero Released to Devour Hawai'i's Coral-Smothering Algae - One million sea urchins have now been deployed to restore corals on an O'ahu reef. A non-native algae was introduced to Kāne'ohe Bay in the 1970s and found an ideal habitat with few natural predators. Like many invasive species, it ended up taking over. It smothered coral and blocked light from getting to them. Corals are the foundation habitat for many fish and other species. This essential fish habitat was being suffocated out, which can have a trickle effect for the ecosystem relying on them as a base.

Luckily, scientists identified a sea urchin native to the area with an appetite for invasive algae. The problem, though, was that there weren't many sea urchins at the site. To help boost the population, National Marine Fisheries Service and the State of Hawai'i partnered to grow and release these sea urchins capable of restoring damaged corals in Hawai'i. https://www.fisheries.noaa.gov/featurestory/millionth-spiny-superhero-released-devour-hawaiis-coral-smothering-algae

#### Thursday:


More big fish. By the end of the day, everyone had landed their personal best!!!! It was time to head back to port.
