## Hoop Netting in San Diego Harbor by Jan Howard

Newest club members, **Jason & Justin Fleck** treated this club member to an evening of hoop netting last week. I met the famous Fleck brothers at the Shelter Island launch ram at 5:00 p.m. The weather was predicted to be 10-20 knots of wind with a low of 38 degrees. Jason and Justin both had warned me to dress warmly and wear my slickers. I bundled up with five layers of clothes because I like to always follow the captains' directions – and on this trip they were both captains—trading off running Jason's skiff.

Jason had all 10 hoops baited and ready to drop. A combination of chopped sardine and mackerel had been stuffed into the bait containers (a PVC pipe with holes). Jason directed us to the most productive spots and we dropped our hoops. We then ran back to the bait receivers to stay out of the wind and about 7 p.m. we decided to make our fist pull. They were in about 40-50 feet of water. I sat in the bow with a flashlight looking for our buoys. After nine unproductive efforts we decided that it was too early and too light for the lobsters to start crawling.

We went back to the bait receiver to wait. Jason didn't really expect much activity until the tide was due to change at about 9:30 p.m. We tried our hand at a little bass fishing along the edges of the receivers to pass the time. It was my first time to walk the receivers, let alone fish from them. The bass weren't cooperating either, however, it may have been due to the sea lions jumping around chasing something. We waited 20 minutes and went back out to pull the nets again. This time Justin pulled up a couple of short lobsters; a rock crab, a sculpin and one legal sized lobster. Back to the bait receivers and to wait and have our picnic dinner—heartly sandwiches.

The third pull was mine. Jason instructed me on the least exhausting method to pull the nets and keep a steady upward movement to prevent the bugs from crawling out of the nets before reaching the surface. My first net yielded a legal lobster and I was very excited. I pulled the other nine nets with another couple of shorts. We had two legal-size lobsters on board and the tide was just beginning to change. Back to bait receiver to wait. The next pull was Justin's. This was the most productive as Justin pulled up one net with 4 lobsters, 3 of which were legal. Nine bugs in all on this pull and things were changing and the bugs were really crawling.

We reset the nets and made another couple pulls before we decided to call it quits at midnight. We ended the evening after 7 pulls in all (2 for Jason, 2 for me and 3 for Justin) which produced over 30 lobsters. We had 7 legal-sized lobsters. Heartbreaking though was that many of these lobsters missed being legal by only a quarter of an inch. I guess we'll have to wait until next year for them to grow up.

I am grateful to the *Excel's* Chef Jason Fleck and the *Excel's* newly promoted First Captain Justin Fleck for the fabulous evening of hoop netting in San Diego Harbor. ■

# Revisiting the Revilla

Some of the club's long range fishermen might be interested in this recap of a tagging trip aboard *Royal Star*, this past February. Closed to recreational fishing within six miles of shore about four years ago, several "tagging" trips—all catch and release—were planned to get us an update on the fishing ecology at this Mexican Marine Ecological archipelago. These notes were sent to *Chum Line* by a fishing buddy, **Phil Bruce**, who lives in the San Diego area.

All fishing is done using circle hooks. The recommended hooks are Eagle Claw in 7/0, 8/0 and 9/0 sizes. We flattened out the barbs on all the hooks. If anyone tells you that circle hooks don't work on larger fish, I would not agree based on my experience on this trip. I only pulled one hook on one big fish. For wahoo fishing we used 90# wire on everything.

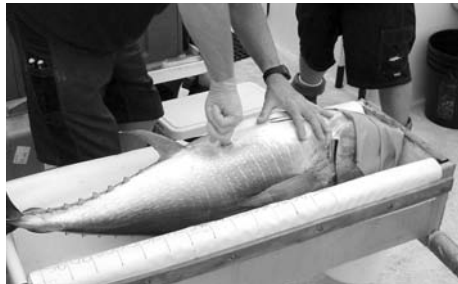
There are two types of tags deployed. One is a conventional tag that is inserted in the back of the fish using a pole when the fish is brought alongside. The "textbook" release method is to use a gaff to flip the barbless hook out of the corner of the fish's mouth. If, for some reason, this doesn't work, a very brave (and youthful) crew member does the upside hanging trick from the rail and attempts to remove the hook by hand. (imagine doing that with a wahoo on the line and a shark hanging out nearby!) If



the effort fails the line is cut as close as possible to the fish as possible.

The second type of tag is an "archival tag". It is about the size of a C-cell battery with a fiber optic cable sticking out the end. These tags are inserted surgically in the

abdominal wall. The procedure for large fish is to lead the fish into a large brail net (standard pole and ring "dip-net") It is then hoisted through one of gates and carefully placed on a mat. Its eyes are covered with a cloth, the hook is removed, and a length measurement is made. At this point the fish is quite docile and the surgery is performed. A small incision is made, the device is inserted with the cable protruding, two sutures are taken, and the fish is returned overboard. Yellowfin

can live for about 3 minutes out of water and the procedure is easily accomplished in that time. The tag number, the angler's name, and the length of the fish are saved via a tape recorder for later documentation

Smaller fish are brought on board by hand and are placed upside down in a trough device, which makes them easier to handle. Otherwise the procedure is the same. Archival tags must be recovered to obtain data. They last about 5 years and record depth (pressure), internal and external temperature, and

light (at 1 minute intervals). The light readings can be used to approximate position (by estimating high noon and sunrise/sunset).

I have a few personal observations about tag fishing "at the islands". The shark population is alive and well. Since we wanted zero mortality we had to move quickly to escape them when they became a problem. Roca Partida was unfishable, but there was enough real estate at Clarion and Socorro to successfully manage the process. The bird population is alive and well and they love sardines from San Diego. Yellowfin tuna that live with sharks fight amazingly hard. A 35 lb. fish can actually put up a good fight on 100 lb. test line. If you participate in this type of effort you have to be willing to fish with heavy line throughout. They have to be alive and well when they reach the boat.

For those who harbor the fantasy that there are big schools of 400 lb tuna everywhere, because the islands have been closed to fishing, this does not appear to be true.

\*\* For those who further fantasize that there

are schools of 80 lb wahoo ready to jump in the boat – we didn't see that either.

Nevertheless, fishing at the islands is as good as it gets, just as it was when the reserves were established. In conclusion, fishing with Tim Ekstrom and the crew of the *Royal Star*, was as good as it gets. Our totals were 591 yellowfin and 114 wahoo.

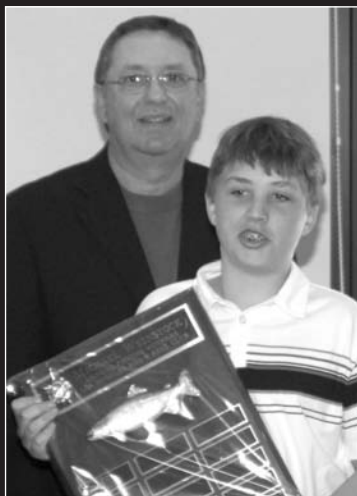
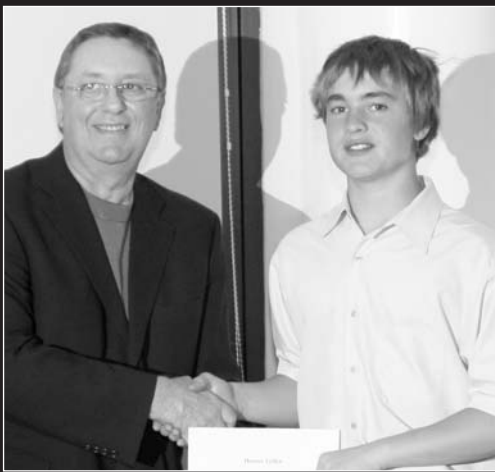

## RECORDS TO NOTE:

The IGFA Report in the March issue of *Sportfishing Magazine* ran a story on an all-tackle application for a new sheepshead record. **Ron Penn** of Chula Vista applied after he caught a 20 1/2-lb. fish that hit a live sardine off Point Loma.



A new potential record on blue fin tuna took four hours to land. The story, in *Saltwater Sportsman* (3/07) told of a 875-lb. bluefin caught trolling off Morehead City, North Carolina, weighed 131 lbs. more than the current state record. **Dennis Meinhart** was fishing aboard a private boat.

## SEA LION ATTACKS REPORTED

California authorities are hoping to catch a sea lion that bit a woman's leg at the Berkeley Marina and nipped another person's backpack. Meanwhile, only boats and their customers and crews will be allowed at the dock where the attack occurred for several days. And crews have been asked to keep a eye out for the creature.

Gulf of Mexico fishermen were not as blessed due to the hurricanes. Landings by leadings ports (USA) are: (1) Dutch Harbor Alaska—887.6 million lbs. (2) Intracoastal City, LA—464. million pounds. (3) Reedville, VA—373.4 million lbs. Guess what? Los Angeles came in 9th out of ten top harbors at 139.2 million lbs.

## CONGRESS AND FISHING...

The reauthorization of the Magnuson-Stevens act late last year is a step in the right direction for recreational anglers. MSA is the law that has governed our fishing for about 30 years. At that time the country realized that foreign vessels were decimating our fishery resource and a 200-mile limit on them was imposed. The USA now recognizes the 200 miles zone off all of our coasts as an exclusive economic zone (EEZ). At the time of the initial MSA enactment, unfortunately legislation was also passed to encourage domestic fishermen and made construction loans to finance this. We all know of the abuses that occurred and finally in 1996 a buyback program became part of MSA revampment.

The most recent enactment (2006) of Magnuson Stevens has provisions that read as follows: **Sound Science** must be used to arrive at any restricted (to recreational fishing) areas i.e. MPA.s! A review process is supposed to determine when the MPAs are no longer needed.

Recreational organizations were divided on the issue of salt water taxes. Some states have them and others not. **Taxed Fishermen** will remain as is but where no fees are mandated a fishing federal angler registry will be introduced.

It is recognized that fisheries often have no **borders**. Foreign competitors who do not live up to international regulations will see more teeth

put into these.

**Bycatch** was very much on the agenda. MSA seeks to identify those fisheries with the most environmental abuse impact.

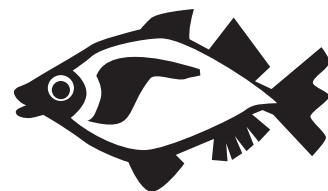
Improvement of **catch report data** systems. Promised by 2009 it should reduce current inadequate surveys.

While recreational fisheries, responsible for a \$36 billion dollar industry, have not been acknowledged as an important factor, MSA promises to listen and not make decisions without input from the recreational sector.

Some say that these provisions may not halt the decline in fisheries, they are nonetheless a hope. Achievement of our objectives with the national congress always face huge hurdles.

Support of your favorite recreational advocacy group can be a good move if you're been lethargic about it in the past. Do you want the sport for your kids?
