A Look at our Glorious Past

The morning after Thanksgiving I met with some of the illuminati of LARRC and we cleaned out the storage area. I had a special reason for being there. I knew there were more than twenty years of old Chum Lines hidden away. I had discussed with my co-editor, Sophia Huynh, how great it would be to have a special column from time to time, that shared an article from the past editions.

A few months ago we published an article in celebration of the life and passing of George Mio, skipper of the boat that the infamous Dirty Dozen fished every Wednesday. I came across an article from the August 1982 Chum Line, authored by the "Dirty Dozen Correspondent"

In effect, this would be a small gesture of thanks to the fish gods for all the abundant catches in this and past seasons. We would spare the lives of many of many little fishes so that they may live on and prosper and raise other little fishes and produce generation after generation of more little fishes and everyone would be happy and grateful to the Dirty Dozen. After this

impassioned speech, there was not a dry eye in the galley. We pledged not to tell George Mio who was asleep in the wheelhouse. George gets very sensitive if his fishermen do not catch fish. LARRC SURF FISHING SEMINAR WITH NICK EKDAHL SUNDAY 8-10-14



The LARRC Surf Fishing Seminar presented by Nick Ekdahl at Santa Monica State Beach was well attended on Sunday 8-10-14. Nick asked his longtime friend and co-worker Al Schneider to be his co-host for this seminar.


Several club members attended: Nick Ekdahl, Steve Simon, Andy MacDonald, Ron Ashimine, and Joel Steinman. I apologize if I have left anyone out. Roland Gutierrez was Nick's guest. Nick started the seminar at 7:00 AM by introducing Al Schneider to the group. Al is a "Long Rod – Live Bait" surf fishing specialist and he brought along all of his set-ups and his buddy Bob to assist with his presentation. Al handed out his recommended tackle list and discussed his techniques and his special custom rigging. He even had his beach cart for hauling his equipment. He explained that he uses multiple rods and live bait. He showed everyone how he ties up his terminal tackle and the lug worms that he brought for bait. He also touched on the various species of fish, rays and sharks that can be taken with this method. This was a new and interesting perspective on surf fishing for some of us; this is "Old School" for those who have been surf fishing for a long time. The "light tackle" revolution has only taken place in the last 20 years or so.

We all made our way down to the shore line, found some likely looking structure based on the behavior of the waves and started fishing. Al set up three long poles in sand stakes and using 3 to 4 oz. pyramid or bull dozer sinker to get his bait out past the shore break. A few surf perch were caught and then all the excitement began. One of Al's reels started to scream and Bob was yelling at Al to grab it. Al was hooked up to something pretty big and during all of the excitement of fighting it he backed up the beach right over Bob's set up! All of us headed over to see what was on the other end of the line and we were astounded to see a huge Spot Fin Croaker emerge from the surf! Spot Fin Croaker is a very rare catch this far north; they are more common down in Orange County and San Diego. Pictures were taken and it weighed in at 5+ lbs. Al released it and went about re-setting his rigs. Just a few minutes passed before he had another reel go off and to our amazement he had a second Spot Fin

Croaker! We were all quickly becoming believers in his "Long Rod – Live Bait" method. By the end of the session he had added a couple of Corbina to his count as well. Everyone else caught plenty of barred surf perch and Steve Simon caught a beauty. I think we all looked at our fishing equipment in our garages later that day to see what we could use as "Long Rod – Live Bait" rigs next time out.

Jalama Beach Road Trip #1



On Saturday, October 18th, my brother Kris and I left Glendora, CA at 9:00 AM on a road trip to Jalama Beach. Jalama Beach is a Santa Barbara County Campground located on the beach north of Gaviota and south of Lompoc. It is a 15 Mile drive west from PCH 1. The beach stretches for a couple miles north and south of the campground, beautiful classic Southern/Central California coastline. Kris had been there camping several times before and he had caught some humongous surf perch and has the pictures to prove it. I had never been there. Jalama Beach is renowned for its remoteness, great surf fishing and the World Famous Jalama

Burger. We drove straight through and at 12:00 noon we were sitting down to a beer and a World Famous Jalama Burger for lunch. The burger alone was worth the three hour drive, fantastically good! After polishing them off, Kris and I geared up for some surf fishing. The conditions unfortunately were less than favorable. Jalama also has a reputation for being very windy and the wind was present that day as was the kelp. We kept working at it and Kris finally hooked up with a nice slab perch that taped out at 12". He caught another one shortly after that and I was starting to get a little frustrated. Finally I had a hard bite and had a fish on! It was big enough to take some drag so I took my time getting in to the short surf. I got it close enough to see and when I lowered my rod to surf it in it came off so no pictures of mine. We had been at it for a couple of hours and the conditions showed no signs of improving so we called it a day.

Our plan was to stay overnight in Santa Barbara and then pick a spot to fish on the way home on Sunday. My wife Lori had made our hotel arrangements at the Comfort Inn and that worked out great as there was a nice choice of restaurants within walking distance for dinner Saturday night. We chose a family owned pizza joint and had a great meal while watching some college football, good times. After a good night's sleep we got up early, had a small breakfast and headed south on the Pacific Coast Highway. We talked about where to fish on the way home, Butterfly Beach near Montecito is a neat little stretch of beach that I have fished successfully in the past but we settled on Santa Claus lane down in Carpinteria instead. The conditions were a lot better, very little wind, small surf and hardly any kelp. It was not long before we were hooking up on the surf perch and quantity made up for quality as we both caught double digits on perch up to 10", no huge slabs but plenty of fun. After a couple of hours of perching we decided to hit the trail home. Close to home we stopped at one of our favorite Mexican restaurants and capped off our surf fishing road trip with a nice cold margarita while looking over our pictures of the adventure. 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Hunting for Blue Marlin in the Pacific and Atlantic Oceans

Since I could not keep up with the great anglers in our Club on the local fishing scene this year (very best in history) I decided to direct my efforts and those of my wife Pamela, in pursuit of blue marlin in both oceans.

My first trip was at the beginning of August when Bill Royster, the CEO of Los Sueños Resort and Marina invited me for a trip on his 45' Cabo Express out of our marina in pursuit of blue marlin in the Pacific. We left under terrible conditions with very heavy rain, wind and seas for the first 5 hours. Then the weather got better and better as we ran out over 100 miles to a secret location where our CEO installed 2 large FADS (Fish Attraction Devices) which were dropped in 1000 feet of water with giant concrete anchors with the FAD itself (like a small raft with wood and other materials located on a platform and submerged about 100 feet over a pinnacle at the bottom of the ocean.



We started to fish the second day at 6AM with sunny skies and a flat ocean. The marlin were quick to respond. We went 10 for 11 with the fish, all caught stand-up on 30lb test mono, averaging about 300 lbs. It was a great day of action since almost all of the time, when you fish for blue marlin, you are very lucky to see, let alone, catch even one on several trips.

The next trip was in early September to the American Virgin Islands (St. Thomas) to fish the first three (and very best) days after the start of the full moon. Pamela was very excited knowing she had a good chance of catching an Atlantic Blue and reducing her quest to qualify for the very difficult IGFA Royal Billfish Grand Slam Club (only 8 women have registered with over 400 men doing so). The Slam consists of catching both a Pacific and Atlantic Blue Marlin, Pacific and Atlantic Sailfish, a Black Marlin, a Striped Marlin, a short billed spearfish and a swordfish on rod and reel.

We picked the best boat ("Freebie") a beautiful Viking Sport fisher and very best crew, with Captain George Beck at the wheel along with first mate, Vince Austin, our friend



from the Resort who flew in from Florida to help Pamela catch and release this very important fish on her list with only 2 fish remaining to accomplish the Slam. It didn't take long – Pamela put the flat line out with a lure when the first fish was raised and brought close to the boat with a teaser and proceeded to catch and release three nice blues in three days with the biggest estimated at close to 700 lbs. Feeling sorry for me she stepped aside (which is very rare for her on a fishing boat) and let me catch 3 also, but not as big as hers of course. We went 6 for 6, which is not done very often. The fish in both oceans were very aggressive and didn't stop biting until they were hooked.

Seeing Pamela hook her fish standing up only 50 feet from the back of the boat and then get in the chair with no help was very exciting. A drone (see photo) flown by our second mate, Carson Byers, captured a lot of the action. All of the fish were tagged and released. Vince and Carson shared the very difficult and dangerous job of wiring (grabbing the leader) and releasing the fish (see photo).

If you want to catch (and release) a big blue marlin St. Thomas is the place to go in the summer months during the full moon cycle.

CALLING ALL COOKS

SEARED TUNA

By Paul Varenchik

Ingredients

- Fresh Tuna
- Peanut oil
- Sesame Oil
- Furikake (see note)
- Asian Seasoning from Costco
- Green onions

Preparing fish

- Cook a nice chunk of tuna in hot peanut oil on all sides for about 1 ½ to 2 minutes.
- Remove from oil and drizzle sesame oil all over fish.
- Roll fish in a combination of Furikake and an Asian seasoning from Costco.
- Chill fish in refrigerator for 45 minutes to one hour.
- Remove and slice with serrated edge knife.
- Garnish with green onions.

Dipping Sauce (combine all ingredients)

- Soy Sauce
- Sesame Oil
- Dash of honey or sugar
- Dash of vinegar (your choice)
- Sesame seeds
- Dash of fresh garlic

Note: Furikake (振り掛け / ふりかけ) is a dry Japanese seasoning meant to be sprinkled on top of rice. It typically consists of a mixture of dried and ground fish, sesame seeds, chopped seaweed, sugar, salt, and monosodium glutamate. Other flavorful ingredients such as katsuobushi (sometimes indicated on the package as bonito), or okaka (bonito flakes moistened with soy sauce and dried again), freeze-dried salmon particles, shiso, egg, powdered miso, vegetables, etc., are often added to the mix (Wikipedia)

IMPORTANT SPORTFISHING REGULATIONS CHANGES ON TAP FOR 2015

The rules we fish by for several popular species will change next year. Not all of these changes are bad but things are indeed going to be different and will affect many of us. These changes include:


Blue Fin Tuna: The Pacific Fisheries Management Council (PFMC) has proposed a 2 fish per day limit for U.S. federal waters (3 miles out to 200 miles.) Limits for multi-day trips would be 6 fish maximum.

This does not affect catches made in Mexican waters. As we witnessed last summer, Mexico can (and does) change the rules mid-game so be prepared for anything.

Traditionally California has adopted federal guidelines so expect the 2-fish limit to apply inside the 3-mile limit as well.

Sculpin: These saviors of the half-day fleet will now see a September through December closure. The bottom dwelling "rattlesnakes" have been heavily targeted by the twilight fleet and exceeded the allotted recreational catch, prompting the change.

Rockfish: Better news on this front. Although still in the regulatory process as of this writing, the California Fish and Wildlife Commission is expected to allow fishing out to 360 feet (we were restricted to 300 feet this year.)



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Ling Cod: Bag limits (again still in the regulatory process) are expected to increase to 3 fish per day, up from 2 fish this year. Lings have made a nice recovery in recent years. If you've been on the Club bottom fishing charters you have seen this first hand. It's nice when a management plan works and anglers can participate in the benefits.

As always, we'll keep our members informed through the Chum Line and via email blasts as changes occur.


