




# HUBBS

This summer the Los Angeles Rod & Reel Club made a gift of \$10,000 in support of Hubbs-Sea-World Research Institute's (HSWRI) sustainable seafood program! The generous gift, along with a gift from the Marina Del Rey Anglers, matched an anonymous \$25,000 contribution to total \$50,000!

With this \$50,000, HSWRI will install a seawater recirculating system vital to the health and welfare of the broodstock in their halibut research program. The broodstock are key to the Dick Laub Fisheries Replenishment Program. The Program was established in 2015, a partnership between resource management agencies, the scientific community, private donors, and recreational anglers. The Program is working to evaluate the feasibility of rebuilding wild stocks of California halibut the way HSWRI has done with white seabass since 1983. Replenishment, through releases of cultured fish, is a proactive approach to renewing regional fisheries.

Several LARRC members visited the Institute on Saturday, November 11, to see the program up close. HSWRI President & CEO Don Kent and Vice President of Development Eileen Sigler were on hand to show the club members around and thank them personally for the gift. HSWRI is grateful as ever for LARRC's generous support!

## CALLING ALL COOKS

In cool weather, soups are the in thing. Many soups take too long, or are too rich. In the holiday season there are plenty of calorie filled foods, so why not put a rich, creamy, very low calorie and super delicious soup on the menu?



Butternut and acorn squash are low in calories, very flavorful and easy to prepare. This recipe has three main ingredients other than seasonings: Squash, onions and chicken or vegetable stock. No cream, no milk no butter. It will keep for a week in the refrigerator.

Both acorn and butternut squash are in season. Buy about 2-3 pounds. You can buy butternut squash already peeled and cubed in many markets. Cut into rings or in halves, seed it, brush it lightly with olive oil and place on a foil covered sheet pan in a 350-degree oven set on roast. It is done when tender, about 35-45 minutes. While the squash is roasting, peel 3-4 brown onions and slice them. (Tip, wear a snorkel mask to avoid onion tears) Put the Onions in a large pot with a little oil and slow cook, stirring so they do not brown or fry, till caramelized. By now the squash is done. Peel it...very easy, add it to the onions and add a quart of prepared stock. I use the quart boxes from Costco and Trader Joe's. Stir it and heat it till it starts to bubble...not boil. Add pepper. I use black ground and I add a teaspoon of curry powder. I do not use salt. Seasonings are to your taste. Try some cumin or hot sauce.

Get out the blender or Vitamix and puree it in batches. If too thick, add more stock. To serve it, put a dollop of thick yogurt or Mexican crema on top of each bowl and sprinkle very lightly with paprika and maybe some cilantro or parsley.

# Local Bluefin Tuna in December

It was the middle of December and the Internet reported that the bluefin tuna were still biting in United States waters. A day and a half trip on the Pacific Queen confirmed the rumors.

Per the Internet reports, the boats were running with light loads, usually 8 to 12 people. However, on the day I decided to go, three of the four scheduled boats canceled, resulting in a full load of 33 on the Queen.

The crowd was what you might expect for people who are able to get off in the middle of week to go fishing one last time in December. Some from the bay area, who drove in the night before. Somebody from San Luis Obispo, who endured seven hours on the freeways. Several from Ventura, seeking to avoid the fires and breathe fresh ocean air, which was available after a four hour drive to reach Fisherman's Landing.

Captain Drew had his pick of the boxes at the bait receiver since we were the only boat running. A nice batch of sardines and we were off on a leisurely cruise to the 60 mile bank.

By 4:30 in the morning half the load of anglers was up jigging the 200 gram flatfall to see if there would be any takers. One lucky angler in the bow had three. Personally, the two hours of dropping and retrieving the jig was good exercise to get the blood circulating to ward off the morning chill. By sunrise the flatfall bite was over but the bait fishing was starting in earnest.

The crew had suggested 20 pound fluorocarbon leaders with a number 2 hook, which worked perfectly for the 15 to 20 pound bluefin tuna. There was no wide open action but it seemed that one or two fish were always going. By late morning we had limited on the bluefin and left the 60 mile bank in search of kelp paddies. We found several with brief flurries of small yellowtail. Considering it was T-shirt weather with calm seas and biting fish in December, it was indeed a beautiful day.

Dinner was tri tip with a baked potato, asparagus. Caesar salad, corn on the cob and a double chocolate cake for dessert. A leisurely ride home had us in the harbor well before sun up, requiring us to wait for the place to open. We were able to disembark, load the car, get our fish, and hit the road just ahead of the early morning traffic for an easy ride home. The rest of the morning was spent enjoying a pot of coffee while vacuum packing bluefin tuna. Definitely a lovely way to spend a December Southern California day.

Usually my trips are with many club members. This was a throwback trip, reminding me of my early days of tuna fishing: driving to San Diego alone, getting on a boat with strangers, and running out to the banks. Instead of summer albacore or yellowfin, the target was a bluefin in December. In addition to enjoying a late season local waters tuna bite, my appreciative thoughts went to all the trips during the year with the club members. Happy holidays to everyone.



# INTREPID 10-DAY TRIP

## OCT 29 – NOV 8, 2017

We normally hope and pray for lots of variety on our a10-day Fall trips. But Garth Brooks sang “Thank God for Unanswered Prayers,” and that’s exactly how I reflect on our history making 10-day trip on the Intrepid.

The normal spots along the beach and the Ridge were being very stingy with the yield of the normal targets; yellowtail, wahoo, dorado and school sized tuna. Young Captain Sam Moore made a brave and calculated decision to try the Lower Banks as the Excel had passed through the area a few days prior and reported metering a few big fish and hooking a couple of monsters. There were many first time long rangers on board and most of the anglers were equipped for 20 – 50# fish, not Mastodons. The Intrepid crew raced into action to assure every angler had Avet and Seeker combos with 100 and 130 pound spectra and fresh top shots. We had a big fish seminar and I could tell from the body language that most of the guys had no clue on what was about to happen. I am always prepared so I had four Avet/Phenix cow outfits ready to deploy.

We got to the grounds and immediately metered a few fish that were not especially hungry or cooperative. The Intrepid carries 800 scoops of bait and Captain Sam ordered the bait brailed into the water and that did the trick. Those fish responded to our appetizers. I dropped back and my bait was immediately inhaled and the splash suggested it was BIG. I landed the guppy of 145ish pounds in about 10 minutes thinking something was wrong with this picture. The boil looked like it would have been twice the size – a case of mistaken identity, optimism or was this a different fish than the one that first boiled on my bait. The school of fish immediately backed off but within the hour we knew the answer. Three other guys, all less experienced all lost

big fish in their initial run, as they did not implement the seminar techniques and slammed the drag into strike immediately. Can’t stop a freight train like that. It was my turn again and I immediately knew this was a BIG fish. I had my Avet 50- 3-speed, new 8 ft Phenix proto-type rail rod factory built (just for me to test) and knew all my knots, hooks, etc were sano, (aka perfect). This fish came to gaff after an hour, which is longer than I like to be on a fish, and taped at 256#s, beating my two personal bests of 253#s. It was later officially weighed in at 252.6, therefore tying my two previous personal bests. Can’t get a break. But the story is not over. That first day we have a land/lose ratio of a dismal 30/70 due entirely to the experience factor and huge fish. After my first 145# minnow, every fish was over 200#s and 2 exceeded 300#s.

The next day the big fish keep on destroying gear and spirits. One new angler, Dave, lost 2 giants after 2 hour battles with each one due to a pulled hook and broken spectra, respectively, but to his credit he was immediately at it again reminding me he remembered what I told all of them to keep at it. Losing two major fights (four hours of heavy weight prize fighting) and he had the same great positive attitude that big tuna fishing requires. I promised him good things were going to come. It’s mid day, the bright sun over head and the bite has tapered way off. I grab my 100# stealth outfit, Avet 30 wide 3-speed with another Phenix 8ft prototype and connect with another nice fish. After an hour there is almost no progress. This is not good. Way too many bad things can happen while you are battling a big tuna and the odds go in favor of the beast every minute your line is still in the water. After two hours I get my 300’ marker I put on my spectra on my reel. For the



next hour I see my 200' marker come onto and off my spool 30 times. Every time I make any headway the mother @\$%&#er takes back my progress and begins to strip my dignity. I remain hopeful and positive but realize I may be losing the battle. I just can't budge him higher than 200'. I wish I had my Avet 50 three speed with 130# line but I still have, 33#s of drag at strike and am just past strike. But the beast is not yet up and down and I am not ready to go to Full.

I finally get my 200' marker back on my spool and am able to inch him up. He is doing his huge circles with a giant tail beat. I hear screaming that a big tuna was just welcomed aboard that taped at 371#s. Holy shit! I am invested in this fish. Please God, help me! Inches at a time he comes up and I am now at full drag, 40#s of tug-a-war. Captain Sam and 4 other crewmembers are giving me a progress report, 50 feet, 40 feet, 30 feet, 20 feet, I see gaffs go in the water but so does the beast and he takes another 30 feet of line. I make more progress as the crew is giving me his location. He is one gaff length away. I know anything can happen. I have seen many bad things happen. I am grabbing the line with my left fingers, reeling and yielding nothing. The captain orders the first gaffs in, I see the crewmembers lurch, and my heart sinks as my line breaks and rod pops free. CRAP!!!!!! But they are screaming we got it, we got it. The fish was my first Super at 325 pounds. I have never fought a fish that tough and have never fought a fish for 3.5 hours. I don't recommend it! A few high fives, a photo and I was back in the water 20 minutes later. Thank God I did not get bit.

Day 3 and the reality is sinking in. This is straight cow fishing; only 3 fish under 200 pounds. I've had 10 day and 15 day trips with more cows but never straight cows. For the rest of the day I am committed to use only 130# and my big reel; no more 100# line for me. Another couple 300# fish are welcomed aboard. With a 350 and 371 on board I know there could be a 400 pound Kevin type fish lurking about. I get nailed again. It feels really big but they all do. There are a dozen guys who don't have a big fish and next to me is a really cool guy who deserves this fish and I hand it to him. After 1.5 hours he lands a fish that weighed in at 251# beating his personal best by 200#s. BTW, Dave gets nailed again and after another two hour battle is rewarded with a 238# giant. Well deserved - 3 times was a charm.



When the dust settles we count 20 big tuna, 17 cows over 200#s with 5 of them over 300#s. All 17 cows were personal bests for 15 anglers. All anglers had the opportunity to feel what a giant tuna feels like screaming line off your reel like a runaway freight train. Nine anglers did not catch a big tuna, but they all took plenty of AHI steaks home as the lucky shared with those who were not able to land a big one.

I hope next year we have a nice variety trip for our 10 day Fall charter but if we don't this was a pretty dreamy alternative.


Thanks to the Intrepid crew and all my fellow anglers who shared this historic trip. Memories for life.
