END OF THE YEAR ENVIRONMENTAL MATTERS

This column, appearing monthly in your Chum Line, hopes to call to your attention the various problems affecting our favorite sport – fishing! Hopefully it will cause you to support constructive causes to help maintain a healthy fishery. Here are some of the current highlights! Your responses will be welcome.

◆ ALASKA FISHING

We have touched on this topic a number of times during the year. There is a new effort on the part of the Alaskan Congressional Delegation to ask for protection from Canadian Mine Operations. Voicing their concerns addressed to Canadian authorities, issues addressed common boundary areas where pollution has affected downstream fishing and indeed the livelihoods of people living in four states.

◆ MEXICAN FISHING

Pacific Coast Sportsfishing reports that the Mexican Government now requires anglers fishing the Coronado Islands to buy a \$5 “biosphere bracelet”. This fee is per day. Permits are now required for all anglers at \$13 per day and an all year permit can be had for \$65. New fees for private boaters have also been announced.

◆ WIND FARMS

Officials in Morro Bay have announced that it may become the first California area for a multi-million dollar project to supplement its power grid.(The State Assembly has passed a bill mandating California to generate 100% of its energy by 2045 from renewable sources)

◆ MARINA DEL REY ANGLERS

Kudos to this local club for their efforts in creating the grow out pens and working with Hubbs Seaworld on this OREHAP project. Our foundation has contributed to this effort in the past. ◆ BLUEFIN TUNA

This species is so much in demand that we can whip up a story each month. This item concerns ATLANTIC bluefin. A new report is out by the European Union Agency for Law Enforcement (Europol) It reports that 88 tons of illegal Atlantic bluefin was seized this past summer. The seizures took place mainly in the Mediterranean Sea. Steps are being taken to better monitor this species before they go extinct. The Pew Charitable Trust sent this report.






I do this for every purchase I make. It doesn't take any longer or use different information or take information. It is just a different portal (entry) for Amazon.

WAHOO & TUNA APLENTY

I fished on Larry Brown's 10-day charter on the Intrepid from the 27th of Oct to the 6 of November. 26 angles, the weather and seas were perfect. What a fabulous trip!!!

We spent 2 plus days traveling to the Ridge. For 4 days we targeted wahoo using mostly Nomad jigs on the troll rods. Purple Fusilier and pink with black strips seam to work the best. There were regular strikes each day keeping all of us standing at the rail waiting for the next jig strike so we could mooch a fish. At many of the stops we were able to hook and land additional fish using various wahoo bombs and baitfish. Most of the anglers had caught one or more before we left the Ridge area.

We also caught and released hundreds and small yellowtails and yellowfin tuna. Fortunately, there we enough bigger school size tuna, in the 15lb to 45lb class, that most everyone had a nice variety of filets to bring home.

From there we left to make the long boat ride to Alijos Rocks. No matter how many times you may have fish "The Stones" it is always amazing to see this 3 huge rock spires, jutting out of the ocean, hundreds of miles out in the middle of nowhere.

We continue the same strategy for the next 2 days circling the rocks. And we continued to have the same success as previously. By the time we left everyone, experienced angler and novice alike had several wahoo and a number of yellowfin.

On the way home we fished off of one of the islands for rockfish to round out our catch assortment. Most everyone

filled out our limits with a nice assortment tasty rock cod fish.

Usually, when doing a long range trip out of San Diego, keeper yellowtail are plentiful. Not so on this trip. Only a handful of 20 plus pound yellows.

I caught my personal best ever wahoo at 55 pounds and 5 total for the trip. Limited out on yellowfin. My total catch weight was almost 500lbs. My freezer is full and I have made many of my friends and neighbors happy.

Captain Sam Moore and his crew worked hard to make sure everyone came away with lots of fish and a great experience.

The crew is friendly and personable. The Intrepid is a terrific fishing platform. The bunks rooms are overall very comfortable, although closet and storage space are very limited. The galley area is spacious and the food was outstanding!!

The trip was so successful that most of this year's anglers have signed up again for next year and within 2 weeks of retuning next years charter is already sold out.

If you have never experienced a Larry Brown charter trip, you should sign up for one. If you have a hankering to do a 10 day trip call Steve at the Intrepid office and get on the waiting list for this trip in 2019.

La Bocana Means Variety

Late October saw club members Joel Steinman, Rob Baldwin and the writer journey to La Bocana for four days of inshore and estuary fishing arranged by Baja Fishing Convoys. La Bocana is on the Pacific coast of Baja, north of Mag Bay and south of Point Eugenia. Much like fly in trips to Cedros Island, our day started at Brown Field in San Diego where we were met and driven to the Ensenada military airport. After boarding the plane, our first stop was Cedros Island. After a short stop for Cedros bound passengers to deplane, we were off again for the 25-minute flight to Guerrero Negro. There we met our driver who skillfully maneuvered us down Mexico Highway 1 to the turnoff to La Bocana. The two and a half hour trip back and forth from

the fish camp was enjoyable due to the outstanding vehicles used for the journey. After settling in our cabins, we were up early for our first fishing day.

Over the course of the four days, 18 different species were caught near shore and in the estuary. Lead by quality calico bass and scrappy

yellowtail, grouper, spotted bay bass, and corvina were the most frequently caught species. The highlight of the trip was Rob's bonefish on the fly rod. Travel times to the fishing areas are incredibly short. About 20 minutes was the longest boat ride we took without fishing. Another bonus of La Bocana is the excellent surf fishing in front of the cabins. Halibut, grouper, triggerfish and spotted bay bass were all caught from the beach.

The restaurant at the fish camp is excellent. We ordered off an extensive menu and the food was included in

the trip price. The only thing not included was alcohol ordered from the bar and the gratuities for the staff and panga captains. English is not commonly spoken, but there were no issues being understood either on shore or on the water.

This out of the way location will grow in popularity as its' comfort and variety of fish opportunities becomes more well known. A repeat trip to La Bocana is already in the planning stage.

NEW APPROACH TO SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA HALIBUT

Try these outside-the-box tactics off the California coast

Many anglers associate California halibut fishing with drifting or slow-trolling over mud and sand flats. Yet some of the most consistent fishing takes place adjacent to structure such as wrecks, outcroppings, jetties, breakwaters and artificial reefs. In my early years of fishing, we'd hook one or two halibut while fishing rocky areas and wrecks for calico bass or rockfish, and the fish we caught were often hefty 20- to 30-pounders. Then it dawned on me that California halibut like structure as much as bass and rockfish.

Depth seems irrelevant, as I have caught halibut on structure in 20- to 200-foot depths. One constant is the manner in which these fish orient to structure. California halibut look for horizontal surfaces, usually the seabed next to the structure. However, I have also caught halibut off the decks of wrecks as well as on low-relief rock slabs.

Work the Edges

If you're targeting halibut, work the edges of a wreck, sea wall, kelp bed, or shoreline cobble that melds to sand. And don't discount inside edges and small sand patches in rocky bottom.

I have caught big halibut using my fish finder to locate smooth patches no more than 20 feet wide dotting a reefy area. Be prepared for a bite as soon as you drop a bait or lure on these patches.

Drift-fishing the edges often proves effective, but consider anchoring to fish an edge, repositioning to work the entire area. Electric trolling motors also help you present baits and lures with pinpoint accuracy.

Current Is Key

While working the edges of shoreline spots and kelp beds, a flood tide generates the best current, transporting forage such as baitfish and squid. On wrecks, rock piles and reefs in open water, the up-current side of the structure often produces best.

Find a point such as the tip of a wreck or the end of a jetty with current flowing around it and you've found the alpha position for ambush predators such as halibut. This is where you will often catch the biggest ones, the so-called barn doors.

Don't hesitate to work all sides of a structure spot, as currents at greater depths sometimes differ from those higher in the water column. If you are fishing an upright wreck that retains portions of its deck, work a bait across it. Halibut like to play king of the mountain on structure.

Live-Bait Selection

Halibut are opportunistic feeders, preying on anchovies, grunion, mackerel, lizardfish, sardines and white croaker, as well as opalescent squid.

Commonly available live baits include anchovies and sardines sold off barges and docks in Southern California. Live squid is sometimes available as well.

Pacific mackerel (known as "greenies"), jack mackerel (known as "Spanish") and topsmelt are easily caught with Sabiki rigs. Five- to 8-inch baits work best.

Keep It Moving

It's important to keep any bait moving. California halibut respond to visual cues like a house cat does to yarn. Drift fishing meets this criterion, but lacking current, bumping the boat in and out of gear or using an electric trolling motor helps keep the bait active.

When fishing an anchor, twitch the bait with the rod to interest a halibut. The principle to keep in mind: Put the bait close to stationary fish to get bit. While live bait is the top producer, halibut also hit lures such as curly-tail grubs and swimbaits fished on lead-heads. Work these along the bottom, but move them faster than you might twitch a livey.

Take It Easy

A big California halibut usually uncorks one run after it's hooked, but that quickly turns to solid weight with an occasional headshake. The best technique is to simply put slow turns on the reel to ease the fish upward. If you apply too much pressure, the fish responds with a wild fight, which can dislodge the hook or break the leader. Pumping the fish leads to excessive head shaking and teeth sawing through the leader. As the fish approaches the surface, back off on the drag because the halibut still has plenty of energy and might stage one last run. Often, however, the fish simply planes to the surface and the waiting gaff.

New Approach... con't

Bait Rigs

Sliding-sinker systems that let halibut run with the bait without sensing any weight are essential for live-baiting success. Use a conventional reel in free-spool or a spinning reel with the bail open to feed line to the fish for five to 10 seconds before setting the hook. Big halibut inhale the bait right away, but smaller ones often grab it by the tail and race away, so give them time to eat the bait fully.

A simple variation on the Carolina rig, an egg sinker on the main line ahead of a small swivel, with a 2- to 3-foot leader connected to a J-hook such as a 1/0 to 3/0 Owner Gorilla Light, is very effective.

And when you need more weight than 3 ounces, opt for the sinker-slider setup. It employs a plastic sinker slider (Eagle Claw Sinker Slide or Sea Striker Quick Slide) on the main line, to which you attach a bank or torpedo sinker of desired weight. This rig works well in deep water and to keep large sardines, mackerel, and other strong, frisky baits on the bottom.

Most anglers use 15- to 25-pound fluorocarbon leader with either rig, since halibut have sharp teeth and tend to shake their heads violently to dislodge the hook.
