GEARING UP FOR THE ANNUAL KIDS' TRIP

It's July, time for firecrackers, barbeques, and the annual Los Angeles Rod &

Reel Kids' Trip. What takes place in one hectic day takes months of planning and coordination. The children do not magically appear on the day of the event. They materialize through the hard work, and dedication of **Bernice Mahfet**. Bernice contacts organizations that specialize in helping disadvantaged or children in need. Seems easy enough, but it is not. The LARRC board determines the number of kids to invite each year based on the number volunteers that are available. The number of children invited is approximately 300. Bernice contacts organizations large and small to come as close to that number as possible. As you would imagine, there are more children in need than we have volunteers to help. Word has gotten out and there are always more groups wanting to participate than we can handle. Adding to the list of challenges are last minute cancellations, no shows, late arrivals,

where to park 11 or 12 vans or buses, organizing the groups on shore, and finally getting the kids on the boats. Then she does it all over again for the afternoon session. **Hats off to Bernice and her dedication to the kids!**

When the children and deckhands board the boats, the rods and reels are already on board in the rod holders. How they get there involves planning, execution and a work session the day before. **Michael Grossman**, tackle aficionado extraordinaire, works his magic and gets the best possible deals on rods and reels. **Maxima** donated the line, **Frank Polak**, our illustrious Foundation President, manages the tackle, insuring that the club has enough quality tackle to meet our needs. The culmination of all this planning is an all day session the day before the Kids' Trip. Volunteers load the tackle from our storage area and transport it to the landing. More volunteers assemble reels to rods and tie on the terminal tackle. Repeat it 200 times. Anyone who did not know how to tie a Palomar knot or dropper loop at the start of the session is an expert by the end of the day. Everyone has a

Qualifier 10 Skiff Trip, June 3-10

The annual Qualifier 105 Skiff Trip was a resounding success. Five club members, **John Ballotti, Dan Felger, Eric Rogger, Al Scow and Chas. Schoemaker, plus one prospective new club member, Noah Skultety**—who subbed for Wayne Caywood—were in attendance.

For those not familiar with the trip, 18 anglers depart from San Diego for a seven-day trip on the *Q105*, heading south off the coast of Baja to the area of Benitos and Cedros Islands to target calico bass and yellowtail. During fishing days, the anglers are split into two groups, each with 3 teams consisting of three anglers for the skiff runs. There are

two skiff runs in the morning, and two skiff runs in the afternoon, with each group getting a skiff run of approximately 2.5 hours per session. The skiffs target calico bass in the kelp, while the big boat goes searching for yellowtail or bass, depending on the circumstances.

The afternoon of the Saturday departure and most of the following day was a travel day to Benitos, ending in a flurry of yellowtail about 5:30 in the afternoon. An excellent pork loin dinner satisfied the anglers who did not fulfill their craving for yellowtail capture.

A move was made during the night to Cedros,

where the cooperating weather allowed a rare opportunity for the skiffs to fish the weather side of Cedros, a first for the *Q105* skiff trips. Although the day was somewhat windy and cold, it was fishable. Mist and clouds were almost to the waterline,

creating a surrealistic setting. The skiffs were able to navigate very near to the coastline and to engage in a long run to explore this side of the island, examining close-up and personal the ragged and rugged rock lines and caves. One of the 7.5-lb bass was caught during this run.

The following day was spent at Natividad which resulted in numerous calico bass being caught and released. In addition to the skiffs having excellent action, the big boat had its own wide open bite for quality bass.

Wednesday was spent at Chester Rocks. The big boat started out the day with yellowtail chewing on both bait and surface iron. Our morning skiff run was spent at Little Chester and along the beach north of Point Eugenia, which is on the Baja mainland. Wednesday was a windy day, causing cancellation of the afternoon skiff run but there was action from the big boat on sand bass, calicos and barracuda. Barbeque ribs were the dinner entrée.

After dinner the boat moved to Benitos, where dozens of seals crashing around the boat ruled out any chance of fishing at night. The morning skiff run was a picturesque tour between the two islands, through a gap, to fish on the weather side of West Island, resulting in several quality bass in the three-to-four-pound category. Several yellowtail were present in the area but rubber hooks resulted in long releases for the club contingent. The afternoon run produced another round of calico bass for all concerned.

Our last fishing day was spent drifting for halibut in the morning at San Martin Island, where club members accounted for two of the three halibut boated. Those

who wanted were able to take a leisurely skiff run through the extensive kelp paddies, picking off and releasing a few more bass before we headed back in for the spaghetti lunch and started the ride home.

Chefs Mark and Ted kept everyone well fed on the long range regimen of three hearty daily meals plus two hot snacks. In addition to those previously mentioned, some of the outstanding meals were the prime rib dinner, turkey dinner with all the sides, and an eggs benedict breakfast.

Big fish of the trip were 7.5-pound calicos caught by Chas and Noah, and several six-pounders by John and Chas. The entire group also had numerous fish in

excess of 4 and 5 pounds. Yellowtail were in the 25-lb range.

Outstanding light line catches included a 3-pound 6-oz. calico bass on 4-pound test by Club President **John Ballotti** and a 3-pound 4-ounce calico on 6-lb test by Chas. Prospective member **Noah** had the trip of a his lifetime, catching his biggest ever yellowtail, 25 lbs., a white seabass (released), a 9-pound sheep head, a big whitefish and a 7.5-lb calico bass.

The **Al and Dan** show provided entertainment for all. The results of the long-standing competition between two of the club's elder statesmen was subject to interpretation, depending upon whether the overall trip was considered or the last several skiff runs were the barometer. Also providing intellectual stimulation during the trip was an ongoing debate regarding the proper equipment for the kelp paddies, with both sides, monofilament line traditionalists versus new breed spectra proponents, being ably represented both in the debate and the results.

Combine great weather with steady fishing, good company and excellent food and you end up with a memorable trip. Next year's trip is filling up fast and undoubtedly will be another success.

He writes: A pod of 10-15 Humpback whales had trapped a large school of anchovies and were "bubble-net feeding". This cooperative behavior is unique to humpback whales. Several whales blow a ring of bubbles from their blowholes to encircle and concentrate a school of bait fish. The whales then take turns swimming through the school with their mouths agape swallowing large quantities of fish. About a hundred seals and a hundred birds, pelicans, seagulls, and cormorants—were also gathered to take advantage of the melee. Says Ted: I was the only one on deck so I snapped away.



KINGFISHER LODGE, SITKA ALASKA

Saturday, June 10th, 17 members and friends of the LARRC flew into Sitka for three days of halibut, king salmon, ling cod and yellow eye fishing. Club members included **Dave Levinson, Fred Trebow, Bob Jones, Arnie Cohen, Ger Steinberg, Sally Vickers, John Vowels, John Rhind, Shelly Fried, Sam Rubinfeld and wife Anne.** Also along were guests **Carlos Perez, Tory Planas, Adam Halem, Ed Peisner, Todd Olson and John Thomas.**

Weather, as always, plays a big part in fishing conditions. Although we got no rain, the wind brought rough seas the first two days. This left a couple of the guests a little green around the gills. Ger and Sally, who have had many years of experience in Sitka felt the fishing might have been a little better if there had been some rain. The team of Levinson, Trebow and Rhind got very lucky on the first day limiting out on both kings and halibut. Ger and Sally, fishing on the *Samantha*, always do well and also limited out on kings and halibut. The other three boats had to scratch hard. The second day found the wind blowing even harder (about 10 to 25 knots). Again, some were able to fill out on kings early and get to the halibut grounds early enough to get set up. For anyone who has not fished halibut in Alaska, it is a lot different than fishing them in Southern California. Usually you anchor in anywhere from 300 to 500 feet

of water and wait for the fish to come to you. This makes it very difficult to hold anchor when the wind is howling severely.

Highlights of the trip included Fred Trebow's 82-lb. halibut, Ger Steinberg's several ling cods caught and released (30" to 40" slot) and Carlos Perez who hung his head over the side of the boat for two days catching his big halibut (60 lbs) on the third day. Local rules require the release of lings that do not fall in the 30" to 40" size. The rumor of the trip was that Todd Olsen had the biggest catch snagging Arnie Cohen falling off an ice chest while examining the backside of his eyelids.

The trip lived up to the club's dedication to fishing, fun, relaxation, and companionship. Dinner time at the Lodge, after a few wines for some of us, was the focal point for solving all the world's problems. With four teachers in our gang we had many funny tales and stories of students, teachers and administrators. We also solved the LAUSD problems although I am not sure how.

A special thanks to Arnie for year after year putting this trip together. Join us next year for what has to be one of most beautiful areas in the world to go fishing.

The 2007 trip will take place Aug. 2nd to 6th. Arnie felt fishing later might be enhanced. ■

Frank Polak reports on Foundation happenings....**We need more volunteers for the July 10th Kids Trip.** A purchase of 75 new Penn spinning reels have been acquired with the help of **Mike (Hawk) Grossman**. **Will Ebersman** has suggested the Foundation might improve their donations by investigating grants—by attending a grant writing class and soliciting large corporations. Jack Genero is looking into airline tickets, hotel stays and other non-tackle donations for next February's auction.

The DFG has initiated checkpoints to enforce current abalone restrictions. They announced that 1112 persons were contacted (i.e. stopped), 79 abalone confiscated and 66 citations issued. There is no commercial harvest of abalone and the state has banned all abalone harvests south of San Francisco since 1997.

A recent meeting of principals of the long-range boats resulted in an official declaration entitled "Ethics of Long Range Fishing". *Qualifier 105, American Angler, Excel, Independence, Polaris Supreme, Red Rooster, Royal Star, Searcher, Spirit of Adventure, Vagabond, Royal Polaris and Shogun* participated.

To encourage responsible angling and promote a positive image of the sport, the following standards were adopted:

- Minimum Sizes for Yellowtail, Dorado and Grouper are 28".
- Minimum Sizes for all tunas is 24".
- Sailfish, Marlin, Sharks and Black Sea bass will all be released unless mortally wounded.

Mexican Fishing Regulations:

- Total of 30 Fish on trips 3 days or more.
- No more than 15 of any one species except for dorado a total of six. Note that if you take six dorado they will count as 15 towards your total limit of 30 .

Anglers are asked to fish responsibly and practice catch and release. ■
