I had the honor and privilege to marry the love of my life and the new First Lady of the LARRC on June 7, 2014. After our wedding, we needed some R & R

and decided to take a honeymoon to Grand Cayman (Little did she know this was really a 7 day exotic fishing excursion.)

Grand Cayman is the largest of the three Cayman Islands and is located in the Caribbean just south of Cuba. The tropical weather, white powder beaches, warm water and natural wonder provide boundless capacity for rest and relaxation. The fishing report didn't look that bad either ;)


My wife and I fished from the beach 5 of the 7 nights in front of the hotel we resided in during our stay. We used chunks of frozen sprats that we purchased at the local tackle store Carolina rigged with a 1 ounce sliding sinker and a 1/0 J hook. Fished the incoming high tide with a 4000 series spinning reel spooled 6 lb mono and a 20 lb. fluorocarbon leader. Thank you to Earl Warren for giving us tackle

advice before our departure. He was right on the money! FYI you do not need a fishing license to fish from shore in the Cayman Islands as long as you practice catch and release.

It was wide open all you wanted Schoolmaster Snapper, Mutton Snapper, Nassau Grouper and Grunt fish between 12 and 16 inches. These fish gave us an absolute blast on 6 lb. line. Average fight was between 3-5 minutes with several strong runs and drag screaming. We saw several tarpon patrolling the shore but couldn't get them on the line.

We also rented a boat from Captain Marvin's charters for a deep sea fishing excursion in hopes of catching Wahoo or Mahi Mahi. We trolled and trolled to catch 3 barracuda. This was my first time fishing from a chair. Let's just say I prefer kicking a 30 lb barracuda's behind standing up.

Overall we had an absolute blast and definitely look forward to returning to Grand Cayman at some point in the future. The people are wonderful, food phenomenal and activities are plentiful. If you do get a chance to visit Grand Cayman, you have to visit Guy Harvey's gallery in Georgetown. I was amazed at all of his beautiful art on display and even had the privilege to meet him in person.

LIMITS OF KINGS IN ALASKA

Alaska, The Last Frontier, is honestly one of my favorite fishing locations. This past June I went on a two-part Alaskan trip with several Gold Coast Lady Anglers (I hold dual membership with GCLA and LARRC).

The first leg of my trip was a 4-day stay in Juneau, Alaska's state capital, with one of

my best friends Dawn. We went to see the Mendenhall Glacier, in the Tongass National Forest. There are trails that take you to amazing viewpoints to see the majesty of an enormous ice field and a massive waterfall that flows in to an iceberg dotted lake. That day we ended up hiking around and through the forest for 15 miles. It was a beautiful sunny day and the only one!! There are so many things to see and do in Juneau, we went zip lining and took the Mt. Roberts Tramway up to the Mountain House. The Tramway is a must if you are there. The views are spectacular as you ride to the top of the mountains. They have a video on the Tlingit culture and beautiful artwork on display.

We took the ferry from Juneau to Sitka, which is a scenic comfortable ride the whole way. The ferry ride showcases the panoramic forest views from beginning to end. I was really hoping to see a bear on the shore..maybe next time.

Once in Sitka, our fishing adventure began. We booked our 3-day fishing trip with Kingfisher Charters & Lodge; this was my third time with them. If you are looking for a first class operation, this is it. They offer transportation, meals, lodging, fish processing and all the little niceties in between. The nonresident fish limits for Sitka

are 2 King Salmon per person/6 annual through June 30 (which are the highest the captains have ever seen for nonresidents), 6 Silver Salmon per day no annual, 1 Halibut per day (under 44" or over 76"), 1 Lingcod per day 2 per year (one 30"-35", one over 55"), 1 Yelloweye rockfish per year, 5 Pelagic rockfish (black bass) per day, and 4 Sablefish (black cod) per day no annual.

Every morning we had a delicious breakfast and were shuttled to the harbor where we met our captains and boarded the boats. We started the day by trolling for salmon using pink or green colored flashers and green hoochies with two downriggers at a depth of 80' - 110'. It was a slow troll and everyone's eyes were watching the rod tip and waiting for it to snap off the clip! We had so much fun reeling them in, netting it and setting it up for the next fish. King salmon are a blast to fight. The smaller size were spunky and jumped when they got to the surface. Our boat had a couple big fish that took tons of line but didn't want to come home with us. We didn't mind, just kept going for the next one.

After we caught our King limits (hopefully it didn't take too long) we motored out to "halibut land." The captains all have their own "secret spots" so I will not say




Halibut, too small and too big.

where we went... We set anchor and the captain used the fresh gills/guts from our Kings for bait. We were using 80lb spectra on Avet Ex reels and Seeker rods. The equipment was perfect! The rest of the day we waited for bites and reeled in our prizes from 300+ feet down. Some were little "chickens" which we threw back, hoping for larger halibuts and in between we caught our Yelloweye limit or hoping for a big Lingcod. One day we went in shore and jigged in shallow water for black bass, the weather was rough off shore so we voted to stay close.

All in all, fishing was fun! We always came back to the dock around 4pm, the vans were waiting to take us back to the lodge. At 5:15pm, a wonderful person brings each condo a delicious hot appetizer; crab or salmon dip, beef kebabs or ribs! Dinner was promptly served at 6pm with amazing options like king crab, prime rib, salmon, or halibut and of course dessert!

Enough about the food, our total haul home was 72 lbs per person, we had 8 in our party. It was a fun and productive fishing trip with lots of memories and new friends!

THE PASSING OF A LEGEND IN SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA SPORTFISHING

George Mio

We are very sad to report the passing of Captain George Mio, a legend in our industry for many years. George had a very difficult life as a young man growing up on Terminal Island. George had to leave USC where he was a senior because he and his family were interned in 1942 and assigned to the Manzanar War Relocation Center in Owens Valley. While at Manzanar George would sneak out of the Center for a day or two with a few friends and fish for trout. George was awarded his degree from USC many years later.

After it was determined that George and many Japanese students posed no threat to our national security they were allowed to continue their education as long as they did not travel to either coast of the United States. George continued his studies at the University of Utah where George obtained his Masters Degree in Business. Being in Utah allowed George to visit his family in the internment camp. George met Ruby, his future wife at a dance while at the university and a few years later they married and went on to have two sons (Arthur and Jeffrey) and two daughters (Marlene and Priscilla). Most of George's customers on his charter boats never knew this history or that George was a very successful insurance agent for New York Life Insurance Company before beginning his career as an owner-operator of sportfishing charter boats.

George and Ruby moved, with Arthur, to

Terminal Island after living in New York. After George retired from New York Life, he pursued his passion of fishing, first as captain and owner of the "Hustler", with his sons Art and Jeff as deckhands and his daughter, Marlene, in the galley. He later built the "New Hustler" and finally the "New Hustler II" in 1968. This boat is still operating out of Ventura and was recently on the cover of WON.

George was made an Honorary Member of Club in 1985, which is a very distinguished honor, and attended many club meetings.

Those of us who had the privilege and pleasure of fishing with George and his family had many successful fishing trips in the winter and spring to Catalina and San Clemente. In the summer George moved the boat to San Diego to fish albacore. Everyone that knew him, including the best captains around, regarded him as one of the very best, if not the best, albacore fisherman in the fleet. His code name was appropriately "Commander". When the summer run of albacore wound down in San Diego, George and his boys took off for Morro Bay where they engaged in commercial fishing for albacore.

In 1986 Captain George retired after spending 35 years in the sport fishing business. WON wrote a front-page story about his fishing career.

Ben Susman, a member of the infamous "Dirty Dozen" (that fished with George every other Wednesday and his wife Mimi,

along with myself and Pamela attended the "Celebration of Life" memorial for George a few weeks ago and we both spoke about our adventures with George. We got to see George's sons, Art and Jeff, who are now very successful businessmen and also George's daughter's Marlene and Priscilla.

The story I told at the memorial was that, back in 1973 it was illegal to

fillet fish at sea and bring the fillets or the fish ashore in a condition in which it could not be identified. The DFG, in its infinite wisdom as always, decided one day to cite all of the captains and deckhands on boats operating out of 22nd Street Landing in San Pedro for filleting about 300 calico bass (they were kept in those days) although the anglers on each boat brought them ashore. George, Roger Hess and Russ Izor agreed to have former club member Norin Grancell and myself represent all three crews totaling about 20 defendants in the criminal trial in the San Pedro Municipal Court. The Director of the DFG, Charlie Fullerton, his higher staff and members of the Attorney General's office attended. Norin and I were able to do a great job in not letting in any evidence of the fishermen because if they testified they would face criminal citations.

After winning the case and handing the DFG a stunning defeat, we met with Charlie and his staff and I prepared a bill to be introduced in the State Assembly allowing most fish, including calico bass to be filleted at sea under certain conditions (i.e. a one inch patch of skin was required to be left on every fillet). After getting the bill through and signed by the Governor we went on the Ranger 85 out of CISCO'S with several members of the DFG including the Director, Deputy Director several wardens and marine biologists of the DFG to catch many calico bass and species of rockfish to determine the minimum length of a fillet taken from a legal whole fish. These actions resulted in the famous "filleting of fish at sea law" contained in Fish & Game Code Regulation 27.65.

The photos that accompany this article are a picture of George and a very old picture on the back of the New Hustler II of George and many of our club members that comprised the "Dirty Dozen". How many can you recognize? (hints – Ben Susman, Julian Wolf, Don Lee and Seymour Rimland)

We will all miss George but will remember the wonderful trips we had on his boats for so many years.

This will help eliminate the high rate of by-catch that includes swordfish and sharks, along with marine mammals, particularly whales and dolphins. As the Commission will be meeting about a week from now; public comment is needed to help put this at the top of their agenda. Our voices were critical in getting the PFMC to begin regulating previously non-regulated commercial take of forage fish. WE ARE BEING HEARD!



a way to start. The rest of the trip was all bonus time.

Of course, it was not to be that way for all four days. They call it fishing, not catching. We have all heard that one. Another day, I could not buy a bite. The

usual suspects, plastics, Warbirds, SP minnows, surface irons, were not working for any of the three anglers on the skiff. So John Ballotti reached deep into his bag of tricks,




Spacious Pangas easily handle 3 anglers.

withdrawing the venerated Braid slammer that at one time actually had some blue paint over the white base coat, the very same jig used by Cathy Needleman on last year's trip to bring a 52-pound white sea bass to the boat.

On that day at that time and location, John could do no wrong. He caught and released fish after fish after fish, for the entire day, while Joel Steinman and I struggled to get anything on the hook. It was John's day to shine brilliantly in the heavy kelp carpet that snagged other presentations

from other anglers. At the end of the day, and the trip, John still had the magic jig in his tackle box.

Joel was a steady producer of calicos over the course of the trip, adding a few yellowtail as well. Allen Rishe started slow but finished strong, catching good numbers of quality calicos along with some quality yellowtail. The 40 pound plus yellowtail boated by 87 year old Bill Vogel edged out the 35 pound class yellowtail caught by 81 year young Dave Levinson to claim biggest

fish honors by an octogenarian.

Overall, it was limits style fishing for the calicos, interspersed with yellowtail, including several from 30 to 40 pounds. Big sheepshead made their presence known, barracuda would occasionally swim by, and some large bonito came out to play. John broke out the fly rod, which, in addition to many calicos being caught and released, resulted in a run of 10 whitefish, capped off by a small yellowtail on the fly.

A highlight of the trip for one of the skiffs occurred when schooling dolphin suddenly rushed toward scores of birds diving into acres of crashing bait. One of the wonder sights of Baja, over by the time the skiff reached the scene. Then, suddenly, it reoccurred. Two hook-ups of big fish, one popping the hook a few cranks short of color, the other almost emptying the spool then breaking 50 pound spectra, left the anglers with tales of the one that got away.

Line archives. A September trip has openings. A return engagement is anticipated for next year. If this is your style of fishing, it can be as good as it gets.






