The Beginning of the End of Sportfishing?

If you're like me you've probably been fishing for most of your life and being on the water has been cathartic. The focus is on the next bite but, it doesn't always matter how much fish you bring home. Especially our charter trips enforce a lot of the camaraderie and when distancing yourself from the everyday routine you know you will come home with a kind of pleasant exhaustion. Where else can you get so much fresh air and enjoyment? Occasionally, you'll get skunked but, often going fishing means having a blast. Is this about to end?

Recent legislation has been passed in our state—because of a presumed diminishing fishery resource—to restrict recreational fishing in certain areas. A number of current bills are aimed at expanding such areas commonly called MPA's. (Marine Protected Areas) These have different designations but I won't quibble about those here. Suffice it to say that there are over fifty marine reserves off our coast and many have been there for years.

Unless you've lived in total isolation you've heard about this since 1999 when the California Marine Protection Act (MLPA) was initially passed. It mandated that we do something to make the fishery resource sustainable and take certain actions to bring back certain depleted species. Consensus on how to go about this, even after years of stakeholder input, was never achieved. The legislature extended its mandate to 2005.

Enter the California Budget Crisis. Much of the media reported that the Schwarzenegger administration had put the creation of no-fishing zones along our ocean on hold. It seems the creation, scientific study and supervision of such zones costs money.

In March of this year Senators Burton & Alpert introduced SB1319. Now called the California Ocean Protection Act. (COPA) It represents the efforts of several NGOs (Non Governmental Organizations) to speed the process of "saving" our oceans and perhaps return things to a pristine state. Note that these groups have some severe political clout and are willing to spend environmental cause money to "help the state" out. The Pew Oceans Report, called America's Living Oceans (2003) appears to suggest some of the language in this act.

In Support: American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees, Defenders of Wildlife, Environmental Defense, Natural Resources Defense Council, Planning and Conservation League, Sam Farr—Member of Congress, The Ocean Conservancy, The Sierra Club, The Nature Conservancy, and Pacific Coast Federation of Fishermen's Associations, the primary commercial fishing lobby, as well as United Anglers of So. CA.

In Opposition: Central Coast Fisheries Conservation Coalition, Committee to re-water the San Joaquin, King Fisher Anglers of So.Ca. Coastside Fishing Club,

Recreational Fishing Alliance.

A companion bill (SB 1318) would allow funds from Prop. 50—bond money which was designated for the protection of water supplies, coastal watersheds and beaches—and approved by the voters for that purpose would now be used to finance MPAs.

This legislation passed the Senate Tuesday, May 25th, and will now proceed to the Assembly. It must pass by June 25 to give voters a final say in November. This bill would take authority over fishing regulations from fishery managers. It will allow special interest groups to control fishing regulations without public oversight. It would create another level of bureaucracy. It is clearly written to undermine the Fish and Game Commission as well as the Dept. of Fish and Game.

It is estimated that the recreational sector takes only 3% of all finfish caught. The environmental sector wants to return conditions to the turn of the century. Not even remotely possible! The elimination of our 3% take would not correct pollution, estuarine problems, not even account for the growth of our population or nature's cycles.

If you fish recreationally, don't take more than you need. Return the extras carefully and let your state representatives know your feelings. You should be unalterably opposed to any fishing restrictions unless there is absolute proof that we are

RFA News Release (5/21/04)

The San Luis Obispo Regional Water Control Board at a 14th of May meeting

commented on the bizarre proposal to “mitigate” the impact of 2.7 billion gallons of water per day circulating through the cooling system of Diablo Canyon nuclear power station.

The Board staff wanted PG&E to contribute to the creation of no-fishing zones (marine protected areas) and conservation easements that would limit public access to the coast. In other words, the commercial and recreational fishing sectors would be kicked off the areas of the ocean to counteract the damage done by the cooling pumps at Diablo Canyon. Another MPA? ■

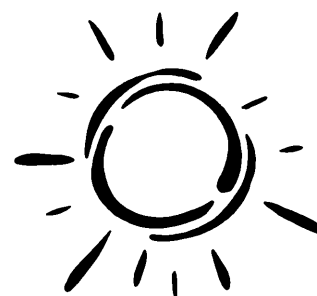

The boat was chartered for 14 but only 8 anglers were able to go—including **Fred Trebow, Tom Polliard, Royal McNair, Alan Rische** and son, and yours truly **Phil Bell**.

We left for Anacapa Island about 4:30 a.m. and arrived at 6:30 a.m. Rachel was up early before the boat stopped and was very excited about her first fishing adventure. She made it abundantly clear to **Captain Bob** that she would not touch the bait nor any fish that she caught.

The captain put us on rockfish quickly, and believe it or not, Rachel caught the largest fish of the day—a good sized sheephead soon after she started fishing. We all caught close to our limits of rockfish, including Rachel, with some decent-sized red snapper and other assorted species, but it took a while to find the right rocks where they were biting. Rachel screamed with glee after each catch much to the delight of her grandpa. Expert angler, **Tom Polliard**, was very successful using a single hook on a dropper loop with a small but heavy jig on the bottom. Near the end of the trip we fished for calicos, but alas, the water was too cold and they weren't biting.

Captain Bob, and deckhands Mike and Greg were terrific, especially with Rachel. Galley chef, Howard, was great and prepared special, tasty dishes for the diet conscious. By the end of the trip Rachel was playing with the sar-

Health, Welfare & Happenings

Albacore and Mercury

The recent articles in the media dealing with the mercury scare in our tuna is reviewed here. You can form your own conclusions.

From the Spring 2004, Pacific Fisheries Management Council Newsletter: A study done by Oregon State University Seafood Laboratory tested 91 troll caught albacore (2003 season) Samples tested showed an average mercury content of 0.14 ppm, reportedly well below the FDA standard of 1.0 ppm. The Oregon study was funded by the Western Fishboat Owners Association and the Oregon Albacore Commission.

From the Editorial Page – National Fisherman, June 04: Methylmercury samples culled from the hair of the mothers of afflicted Japanese children showed 41 ppm. Iraqi mothers showed levels of up to 674 ppm. In their hair. In this country, levels of mercury in hair that is associated with fish consumption is in the range of .12 ppm. This level has not been associated with neurological disorders. The FDA considers 1 part per million in fish a safe level of methylmercury.

From a newsletter—USC Westside Center for Diabetes: The

mercury content in fish has been reported to be higher than we previously realized. Women of reproductive age should be cautious. The following guidelines were proposed: **1**-Avoid eating high mercury fish like shark, swordfish, albacore, king mackerel and tilefish. **2**-Do eat low mercury fish such as shrimp, canned light tuna (but not albacore or “white tuna”) salmon, perch, trout, catfish, pollock and sardines. **For more info call 1-888-Safefood or visit the FDA website: www.cfsan.fda.gov.** ■

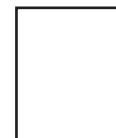
