



PRESIDENT'S CORNER

SMILES AND LAUGHTER, DOOM AND GLOOM OR A MIXED BAG?

The title of this message is a question about the status of our club. What has prompted this question is the troubling cancelation of the May dinner meeting. After our normal publication of the meeting in the Chum Line and

e-mails to the membership, only 9 members replied they would attend. Our guarantee for the restaurant is 25. We have never before failed to have our minimum attend. No speaker should be expected to address a group of 10. We would have been responsible for the short fall of almost \$500, no money would have been raised by our raffle. Excuses for non-attendance were varied. So we are faced with the question, do we reduce the number of warm weather meetings? This issue will be raised and offered for discussion at the June 19th board meeting. Following that there will be a plebiscite to get the pulse of the club. No organization such as ours can survive without the heartfelt support of the membership. Sales of fishing licenses have plummeted, no new fishing boats are being launched, membership in our club has shrunk and new members fewer each year.

JOHN BALLOTTI ATTENDS FIRST MARINE PROTECTED AREA FEDERAL ADVISORY COMMITTEE (MPA FAC) MEETING

The meeting was held in Annapolis, MD where the committee and staff from NOAA, Department of Commerce and Department of Interior met to discuss all things MPA.

However, the first topic of discussion was the eminent demise of the committee. Unless there is a re-authorization by the President, the MPA FAC along with 39 other FACs will end on September 30, 2017 when the Executive Order creating the committees expires. The general mood of NOAA staff in attendance was that there is a good chance most, if not all of the FACs will expire. A letter to Commerce and Interior was drafted to encourage recommending re-authorization.

Between now and September 30 the MPA FAC will begin work on four "charges" resulting in a topical high level submission that will be the basis of continued work if the committee is re-authorized. The four charges are:

1. Making Marine Protected Areas Relevant to a Diverse Public
2. Developing MPA FAC Recommendations for Greater Impact
3. Role of Citizen Science in MPA Stewardship
4. Adaptive MPA Management in a Changing Ocean

The Chairman of the MPA FAC is Brian Baird, Director, Ocean & Coastal Program, The Bay Institute and Aquarium of the Bay.

John was appointed chairman of the subcommittee of charge one; Making Marine Protected Areas Relevant to a Diverse Public. This appointment also puts John on the Executive Committee of the MPA FAC.

The other members of John's subcommittee are:
Jacque Hostler-Carmesin, Vice President of the California Fish and Game Commission
Christopher Morris, Maritime Archeologist
David Robinson, cultural resources
Brian Baird, State Agencies

One or two more members from the MPA FAC committee, who were absent, will join the subcommittee.

The 20 member MPA FAC is a cross interest group with both consumptive and non-consumptive members. There are two representatives from the recreational angler community.



ENVIRONMENTAL MATTERS

◆ FIRST SOME GOOD NEWS.....

Once the source of one of the mainstays of the Northwestern Economy, the waters off Oregon at the mouth of the Columbia River, were an important source of fish for local fishermen. Over-fishing resulted in closures and restrictions since 2000. Fisheries were required to initiate a number of changes since 2011 as a result of which total fish stocks are rebuilding and fishing revenues are on the increase. Under the aegis of the National Marine Fisheries Service the Marine Stewardship Council has declared the most popular fish as sustainable. Biomass measurements note the restrictions and 100% observer coverage indicate allowable catches may soon return seafood sources to normal.

◆ A STEP IN THE RIGHT DIRECTION...FISHING LICENSES...

The California Sportfishing League reported success with passage of Senate Bill 187, largely sponsored by them via Senator Tom Berryhill. The bill should improve recreational fishing opportunities and enhance tourism. California's fishing licenses are the costliest in the US. They have declined in sales over 55% since 1980 even though our population increased over 60%.

Declining sales are also related to the fact that licenses bought all expire at Dec. 31st. Making licenses annual should remedy some of the problems. Hopefully the State Assambly will follow suit. Stay tuned!

◆ SOME NOT SO GOOD NEWS.....

A report in Western Outdoor News (6/2/17) told of the Governors of California and Oregon requesting, from US Secretary of Commerce Wilbur Ross, a declaration of a regional disaster for the salmon fisheries. Such a request asks for federal aid to salmon related businesses. The 2017 season will see many coastline miles closed reducing economic returns already weakened in 2016.

◆ TROUT HATCHERY PLANNED.....

A news item sent in by Chas. Schoemaker (thank you) informs us that Big Bear Lake plans to grow its own rainbow trout by constructing a new \$3.5 million hatchery.

◆ FISHERY ECONOMICS.....

CCA released a memo (May 24) emphasizing the importance of recreational fishing and its economic value vs. the commercial industry. AND it does so with much less impact on the resource. NMFS quotes numbers from 2015. The total fishery activity generated \$200 billion in economic activity. Of this \$13.9 billion was created by the commercial industry, \$38 billion was the cost of the supply chain to consumer, \$92.3 billion reported in seafood imports and \$63.4 billion generated by recreational fishing. Repeating: \$63.4 billion recreational fisheries vs. \$13.9 billion commercial fisheries. Note also that the commercial sector revenue dropped by almost \$10 billion in the 2014-5 time frame. Why does NOAA not spend more time dealing with the problems of the recreational sector? CCA aims to attempt to remedy this. Did you join them?

FISHING IN PANAMA

In early May 2017, I embarked on a 6 nights, 4 days fishing, all-inclusive fishing trip Via Come Fish Panama. (comefishpanama.com)

I actually traveled two nights early as Panama is a long way to go and I wanted to check out Panama City, and get a City/Canal tour. To be candid, skip Panama City and the Canal, and get to your fishing grounds.

Getting to Panama City (7+hours from LAX) is only the 1st of four steps. I recommend a one night layover at the Crown Plaza Hotel / Free 5min shuttle to/from The Toucaman Airport / Panama City. Then you fly approx. 400mi / 1hr flight to David Airport. We were then greeted and picked up by one of the CFP owners Kerry Leggett, and driven in a late model van for around an hour or so to a small boat, which took us to the Island Lodge in about 30 minutes.

The Island Lodge is located on the Pacific side not too far South of the Costa Rican boarder was quite nice, well kept and maintained. They serve a good breakfast (try the fresh Panama Pineapple, it's out of this world!), a minimal lunch and snacks on board the boat with plenty of ice-cold fresh water soft drinks and Beer. The big meal of the day was dinner served in a comfortable on-site restaurant and bar. There's no TV, Cable or otherwise in the rooms (which I found as a big plus), but free Wi-Fi is strong throughout the compound, and you won't need a power adapter for the AC.

The trip objective was to have four alternate Offshore and Inshore days but a freak Red Tide algae bloom blew out the inshore fishing so we spent 3 of the four days chasing Yellowfin Tuna in the Hannibal Bank area around 60 Mi.

offshore from the Island Lodge.

I brought very little as far as my own fishing gear as Go Fish Panama has multiple top end equipment sponsors and well maintained gear tuned and ready for what they fish for every day. And as for the Tuna, we did 90% Popper fishing 10% Chunk bait (half a Sardine on an 8/0-9/0 hook) and one good one was caught on a Flat-fall jig. It's hunting and chasing the fish by sight, where you take it to the fish with the boat charging at high speed ahead of the Dolphins.

The boats were great, 31ft Center Console Pursuit, with twin Yamaha 225's. 4 anglers plus 2 crew was a little tight, 3 fishing acceptable, 2 Ideal. The Captain and one crewman on board did not speak English other than "Drop, Up, and GO!" Spinning gear is as popular as conventional, and the average terminal leader was 80 to 100+lb test.

This kind of fishing is not for the out of shape or the faint of heart! This is non-stop hold-on chasing at high speed, quick cast, pop and retrieve and get bit right away or not at all, hold on and bring it to em' again! The size of the Yellowfin we landed went from the 40's to a best of

over 110lb, and far bigger are hunted on The Hannibal Bank every day, and be prepared, expect to cover up to 140+ mi. on the water each day.

The few "should have" things to bring with you are your Passport, shorts, sunscreen and UV covering clothing for head face and upper body and good insect repellent. The currency is in U.S. Dollars, and the tap water is fine to drink both in Panama City and at the island. Although

Yellow Fever is almost a thing of the past there, you should check with your healthcare provider for what may be other prudent immunizations.

All and all, I had a great trip!





My continued quest for the elusive white seabass continued with a trip with Captain Brandon Hayward. Brandon suggested a 2pm departure for parts unknown. The WSB fishing had been really spotty. Possibly, a trip to Clement for yellowtail would be better? No, let's give the white seabass a try. "Ok Barry, but everything is going to have to be perfect."

- ❖ We had a dozen or so squid in the bait tank—perfect.
 - ❖ So off we went to a spot that he had picked out about 30 minutes up the coast—perfect.
 - ❖ Nobody was on it—perfect.
 - ❖ These WSB prefer mackerel during the daylight, so we jigged up a tankful in about 15 minutes—perfect.
 - ❖ Kelp fishing like this requires a brisk north to south current. We had one—perfect.
 - ❖ Let the line back about 150 feet to the kelp line—perfect.
 - ❖ Don't get caught in the kelp—perfect.
 - ❖ Keep your eye on the float. What float? Reel, reel, reel, you are on a fish—perfect!

Florida Fishing ~ April 24, 2017

While on a recent visit to Florida, my cousin Steve and I experienced a great day of near shore fishing for snook and redfish. The fishing area was just outside of Sebastian Inlet, near Melbourne Florida, approximately 40 miles south of the Kennedy Space Center. Local guide Eric Metcalf put us on the bite, with the Attitude Adjustment, his 22 foot Pathfinder center console. Tackle was Penn Slammer 5500 spinning reels with 20 pound mono and a 40 pound leader.



After making bait, pilchards, a short ride took us out of the inlet into the Atlantic Ocean, where a short U-turn brought us to the holding area for the fish, near a public pier. Before I was even rigged up, my cousin hooked and landed a personal best redfish. The fish was released as it was over the maximum slot limit.

Then, before I could even get baited, Steve was on again, this time with a maximum slot limit sized legal snook, which became the honored guest of dinner at our barbecue later that evening. Needless to say, Steve was having a great day.

Eventually the coffee kicked in and I hooked a 15 pound snook. It was way over the slot limit so it was released to get even bigger. A second snook was also released, then the redfish came though.

Boat traffic was light, and several of the boat operators knew each other, which made for extremely collegial fishing. The schools were moving around, with some boats following the fish and some anchored waiting for the fish to find them. There was generally cooperation if it was necessary to move a boat or anchor line

due to a hooked fish.

For a change of pace, we moved outside to check out an active rip current, which held bluefish and jack crevalle, providing plenty of action. In the 17 foot deep water we could see giant goliath grouper, between 300 and 400 pounds, swimming about. One of my 10 pound bluefish was grabbed by one of the giant goliath groupers. It was an exciting 30 seconds going down the side and across the back of the stern with a maxed out fully bent rod before the line broke.

Fishing on the NEW LO AN, June 2-4

We left on a balmy Friday night at about 8:00 p.m. from Point Loma Sportfishing with a total of 29 anglers. Donald Goldsobel, Sophia Huynh, and Kevin Boyle represented the LARRC. We were joined by members of the Gold Coast Lady Anglers and many friends of Sophia and Kevin Boyle.



Normally, it would have proven very crowded especially around the bait tank. However, I must applaud all of the anglers who cooperated all day by being patient and considerate as we baited up and cooperated at the rail working “over and under” to minimize fouling lines.

Donald Goldsobel caught the first blue fin at the first stop. Fishing was pretty sketchy throughout the day although 19 blue fin tuna were landed. I was very impressed with Captain Marcus and the 2nd ticket Carl who worked continually to find the tuna. At almost every stop at least 1 tuna was caught but the fish were tough to hook – we mostly used braided line with 25lb. fluorocarbon. Eventually folks even tried 20 lb. topshot. Hookups were about “50:50” using 20lb. or 25lb. topshot. The deck crew of Adam, Marcus and Ben were terrific and extremely professional assisting novice and more experienced anglers. Steve the chef made sure no one was ever hungry. Captain Marcus even helped me for about 15 minutes selecting just the right bait and running up to the bow to cast and then handing off my rod to me.

This was a very interesting and unusual trip for me (as I was SKUNKED)! It was my day to fish, but it just wasn’t my day to catch. Never the less everyone enjoyed the day on the water, and Sophia may schedule another trip next year.
