FIRST ALBACORE OF THE SEASON SPOTTED!

They were located at latitude 23 North and longitude 114 West. Later reports from boats returning from long-range fishing indicated more albacore and some blue fin tuna were also encountered. The Longest Long-Range Trip

A rare, rainy morning, February 11th greeted us at Fisherman's Landing in San Diego for a long awaited Clipperton Trip. The Revillagigedo Islands closures, our presumed destination a year ago, resulted in this new destination as an alternative to find the cow tunas we'd become accustomed to. The blustery and rough ride for the next four days gave us time to tune and tinker with our gear and hear the usual seminars intended to indoctrinate and refresh our techniques. The trip

was pleasantly interrupted on February 13th by several albacore stops—among the first of the season. The sixty-or-so albies caught were healthy in the 20- to 35-lb. class. The twelve long rangers on board were to learn that conditions at Clipperton Atoll were not too promising and *The Supreme* would now stop at Hurricane Bank. We had been preceded there by the *Royal Polaris* but they were gone to greener pastures (?) as we arrived after our long haul. Four days of

Press Release from the ASA (American Sportfishing Association)

Notes Unity Effort to Resolve Recreational Saltwater Problems at Florida Meet

Eighty representatives of the saltwater fishing and boating community met at St. Pete's Beach, Florida, Feb. 24-25 with government officials to lay the groundwork for collaborative approaches to marine policy making. Co-sponsored by Boat US, Coastal Conservation Assn, International Game Fish Assn., and Recreational Fishing Alliance. Important to the recreational fishing public among issues covered were catch allocations,

recreational vs. commercial, representation on the eight regional fisheries management councils and the role of marine protected areas.

Since MPA's are currently at the head of our local agenda (California) a common sense approach to these was urged. Joel Greenberg, an LARRC member and co-chair of the newly formed So. Cal. RFA Chapter, attended along with members from National RFA. In the spirit

of conservation, creation of clearer definitions and specific science-based guidelines for the MPA's was urged. These should include public involvement, conservation goals, provisions for enforcement and evaluation criteria. Joel reports that our local MPA issue is very much on the mind of people across the country and that other marine protective areas are not as restrictive as those proposed by local authorities. ■

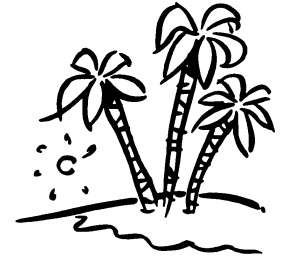

experiences include over 30 trips to the Revillagigedos and many tunas over 200 lbs. He left Izorline after 12 years and now represents Shimano, Power Pro Spectra, and Owner Hooks.

trolling near a bank which is approximately 1/2 mile by a 1 mile showed only a nice wahoo bite but no other significant withdrawals were made.

The tuna were quite scarce and only about 11 were caught during this part of the trip. These were in the 40- to 135-lb. category. LARRC member **Jan Howard** provided us with a technique not familiar to many of us old timers. She'd brought a supply of balloons which were suspended by a leader which trailed a sardine bait at just or below the surface. The wind would carry the balloon away from the stern fairly rapidly so as to get the bait away from the boat. This allowed her to boat three of the larger fish. This *Chum Line* is being prepared prior to the return of the boat so we can't give you the weights. Some of us had the chance to fish the kite but without too much success. Lots of time spent in catching junk fish to be converted to chunk. Bait fishing for trigger fish and squid also occupied some of the anglers. Night fishing for small black skipjack which would have been ideal bait for some real cows

had we located them. About 120 wahoo were taken with an average of ten per angler.

Meantime Capt. Tommy Rothery had many contacts with the *Excel* and the *Royal* to determine their success east of us at the Tres Marias and Cleophus Bank.

A mixed blessing as well. So we left Hurricane Bank for that area. To those not familiar with the territory we spent almost three days sailing easterly. The Tres Marias—a group of three islands—are located not too far from Puerta Vallarta. The resort is home to many local fishing boats also competing for the resource. The weather was perfect and schools of birds and dolphins abundant. The effort was to locate the tuna under the dolphins, an effort made difficult by their rapid movements. We were not always able to pursue the schools since the islands are off limits within 12 miles of their shore. Nevertheless, diligent hunting resulted in a total of 34 tuna near Cleophus. Some of the guys tried night fishing for grouper and pargo. with a few of each caught.

After three, mostly frustrating, days in this area we left to fish some of the banks on the Ridge. Another 18-hr. run and we arrive at Jaime Bank. No

withdrawals made here. Green, 72-degree water. Left by noon to locate Golden Gate Bank. A couple of hours and we check out Finger Bank where in the evening we were able to put on lots of small mackerel bait via our trusty handy, dandy bait lines. The following morning we are at Morgan Bank and again no signs of fish. You get the idea! Then the marlin moved in on our baits for a couple of hours...I got one on the kite using a flying fish frozen from a prior trip.

At two o'clock we left for Cabo San Lucas and the flight home. What happened? The skipper thanked us for not complaining about the scratchy fishing. We all thanked him for trying so diligently and not sparing the fuel consumption in his search. Was it too much bait in the water? Was it the moon phase? Was it over fishing? People smarter than I will have to come up with the answers. 126 wahoo were caught at Hurricane plus some 11 tunas.

On a positive note, both albacore and blue fin were located about half way up the peninsula. Don't miss out on these during the coming summer season! ■

FISHES TO NOTE:

Fishing out of Puerto Vallarta, last June, Bryan Richter of Texas caught a 333 lb. yellowfin from a 24-ft. panga. He and his brothers used 80b. stand-up gear. The fish "woke" up after being boated and wrecked the panga.

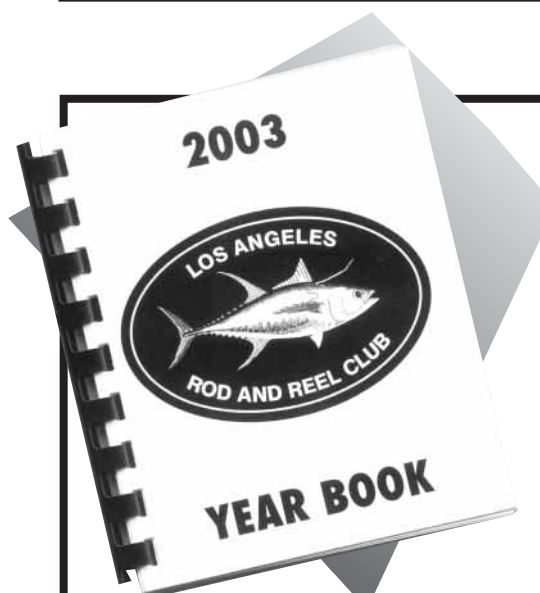

THAT OTHER LAWSUIT (RFA No.Cal.)

LARRC membership is certainly aware of the threatened Channel Islands closures—currently being reviewed at various jurisdictions—members are certainly familiar with the alliance of both commercial and recreational organizations which have filed suit to obtain a restraining order against this closure.

Now we report on another suit filed, against the California Department of Fish and Game Commission and the Department of Fish & Game. Filed in January of this year by a rather large group, Coastside Fishing Club, (2700 members) located on the central coast of California. Coastside challenges the regulations imposed as of January 3rd through July of 2003, which close nearshore rockfish fisheries to the recreational community. The new regulations assume a depletion of rock fish stocks. Yet no documentation of this could be found nor studies located. The regulations allow commercial fishermen to continue to take rockfish.

There are other grounds for the suit and the plaintiff has also mentioned the political influence by commercial interests sitting on the Pacific Coast Fisheries Management Council. Stayed tuned for more in future months. ■

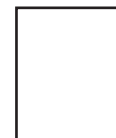
