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
MARCH DINNER SPEAKER LEE BAERMANN

The BUCKET LIST

Scratch one more off the bucket list. What I was after was a yellowfin tuna over 100 pounds. So, I went back to Puerto Vallarta to fish the Maximus for the big boys. Sophia Huynh and Kevin Boyle put together an encore of last year's trip.

We arrived PV Monday afternoon, taxied to the marina, boarded the Maximus and off we went before dark. Fishing at the Tres Marias was different this year. Captain Keith Denette informed us that almost all the fish were being caught deep jigging between 3:30am and 5:30am.

Everyone was up dark and early. The fish were there and the group had decent success picking up a dozen or so 130 to 200 lb yellowfin. With the sun rising, I cut off my jig and baited a live cabby. Five minutes later it got hit and an hour later had my hundred (actually 130) pounder.



That was it for the morning tuna bite, so we headed to the rock pile for pargo, cabrilla, roster fish et al. I hooked something really strong, which turned out to be a 30+ pound amberjack. It wasn't on my bucket list, but it was definitely a keeper.

Wednesday morning was the same routine—deep jigging starting at 3:30am. Eventually, Captain Keith took pity on my weary arm and pinned on a nice squid for me.

Two minutes later it got picked up and the fun was on again.

Just before dawn, we decided to try cabbies again. It was like the whole ocean erupted. There were tuna every-

where, including eight that were on our eight lines.

Three tuna for me over 100 pounds!!!

We fished the rock pile in the afternoon until we ran out of bait. Since the fish hold was plugged, it was unanimously agreed to cut the trip off a day early, so back to PV tired and happy.

This was an amazing trip—approx. 35 yellowfin all between 130-200lbs.

Thanks to the Maximus crew for an awesome experience!!


What's next on my bucket list? How about a 200 pound tarpon in Costa Rica this fall?

I was fishing on the New Del Mar 1/2 day on 2/24/16 out of Marina Del Rey in the AM. I got very lucky and caught a 27 lb. Yellowtail. It was the only Yellowtail caught that morning. I was yo-yoing a dark orange Salas 6x Jr. jig on 40 lb. test using an Avet Raptor narrow width reel on a Phenix 30 to 80 lb. rod. El Niño is alive and well in Santa Monica Bay, and these early season Yellows are a good sign for the immediate future.

ENVIRONMENTAL NEWS

IN CASE YOU HAVE NOT HEARD...

Good news! A recent report from NOAA detailed findings on the status of our fisheries. Noting that overfishing was a hot topic during 2015 the regional fisheries management councils reported that the stocks listed as overfished declined. In 2014 the number of stocks rebuilt since 2000 increased to 37. The report states that overfishing continues to decline! Progress!!!

Eileen Sobeck is the director of the NMFS. National Marine Fisheries Service) She reports that the US imports about 90% of our seafood. This accounts for a \$11 billion seafood trade deficit. Even though some wild stocks are starting to rebuild this situation is not expected to change soon.

Climate change, and some of its effects were the topic of an editorial published in *Salt Water Sportsman* magazine. Warmer temperatures have been noted by scientists in the south Atlantic and Gulf which have resulted in the spread of a toxin called ciguatera. This type of algae affects seaweed and corals, the bottom of the ocean food chains. It has been moving north and may represent future problems. The recent Paris meeting, on climate change, was also attended by executives from BP, Bank of America, Citibank, Coca-Cola, General Mills and others. Finding yourself on an atoll with rising waters or reading about a \$400 million engineering project to keep Miami Beach dry might give you food for thought!

National Fisherman, in January (2016) reports the closure of California's crab season by the Dept. of Fish and Wildlife. The presence of high levels of domoic acids in algae caused this precautionary move.

CCA recently asked fishermen to communicate their support for HR2406 to their House representatives. Known as the "SHARE" act (Sportsmen's Heritage and Recreational Enhancement Act, it passed on 2/26) thanks in large part to the impact the recreational fishing community had. CALLING ALL COOKS

Steamed Whole Rockfish with Mabo Sauce

I looked in the freezer and found a 4-pound whole rockfish. I decided to cook it whole in a steamer.

Ordinarily I steam only filets. This fish was large enough that getting some boneless fish off of it would be no problem. I like to use some kind of sauce on rockfish. There is a dish called Mabo Tofu. The ready to use sauce is sold in most of the Asian markets such as Ranch 99 or Marukai in West L.A. It is delicious.



Ingredients:

Quantities will vary by the size of the fish.

Fresh ginger, matchstick pieces

Green onion sliced on a diagonal

Sweet red or mild hot chili pepper slivered

Sesame oil (optional)

Black bean sauce (optional)


Mabo Tofu Sauce

The preparation: Make sure there are no scales, remove sharp spines with kitchen shears, or garden pruner. Rinse the fish. Cut slashes on each side to the bone. Thinly slice some fresh ginger, green onion and sweet red pepper. Insert slivers of these into the slashes and some more in the cavity. Place the fish on a platter

that will fit into your steamer. Steam until the fish flakes. The efficiency of the steamer and size of the fish will determine cooking time. My fish cooked in 20 minutes.



If you do not have a large steamer, use a big wok with a cover. The difficulty here is getting the plate out of the wok. I used a square plate...easier to lift out. Remove the fish to a serving platter. While the fish is steaming, open, and



microwave a package of the sauce in a bowl. It comes in mild, medium hot and hot. I added some extra sesame oil and black bean sauce.

Pour the heated sauce over the fish and garnish with some of the leftover slivered vegetables. Serve with steamed rice or cauliflower faux rice. (Put the cauliflower florets in the food processor and sauté or steam) Hot Sauce!

Frank always had a smile, laugh or joke. Frank was reputed to be an excellent freshwater bass fisherman although I have no personal evidence in this regard. However one of our trips to Castaic became an everlasting memory when a bald eagle, talons extended, swooped down next to the boat to grab its dinner. A magic moment which became one of Frank's favorite non-fishing fishing moments, surpassed only in recent years when a bear cub swam out to his boat. Frank was always willing to volunteer for anything that would get young people involved in fishing. He ran the LARRC Marine Mentors trips out of Marina del Rey for many, many years. Once I got a call that Frank needed help immediately because there were 150 Boy Scouts in need of angling assistance at Glen Helen Regional Park. A camp counselor took pity on us and led us over hill and dale on unmarked roads in the dark to get us out.

I didn't have the heart to tell Frank that I'd been freshwater fishing since I was 10, but admittedly I was addicted to fishing Senkos, dropshots and other "lazy" baits in my outings at Castaic and Pyramid. So we loaded up on Frank's boat and headed for Pyramid. As we all know, Frank had an abundance of two things: fishing advice and corny jokes. And that day I got a boatload of both. And I had a blast. And we caught fish. In fact I caught 3 species (SMB, LMB and striper) on 4 baits: topwater, crankbaits, jerkbaits and my beloved dropshot. I'm hoping to get out to Pyramid in the next few weeks for the first time in close to a year (last year the allure of the ocean bite was just too strong) and rest assured, I'll hear Frank's advice in my head with every cast. And I promise Frank, I'll leave my lazy baits at home. Tight lines to you forever, and thanks for the memories.

I am shocked and deeply saddened. Frank so loved the art and act of fishing, so cared for our oceanic environment and so loved LARRC and his fellow members. He influenced the club and many of its members, and we are better for knowing and fishing with him. Two of my most memorable fishing trips were with Frank. Years ago on an LARRC charter on the Qualifier 105, Frank and I were side by side throwing iron to ravenous yellowtail at Cedros Island. We were both giddy with enthusiasm as nearly every cast resulted in savage strikes. We started competing and razzing one another if one of us retrieved a jig without it getting bit. Frank also took me to Lake Castaic for my first ever bass fishing trip. I watched him hook bass after bass without ever catching one myself. Finally, he took pity and taught me to focus like a laser on the slightest tick of the line where it enters the water. He said "plastic worms don't swim, so if it moves rip their lips off." I started catching fish. I will remember my friend, Frank, this way. An enthusiastic angler and gracious host and mentor. I will miss Frank and honor his memory.




