ENVIRONMENTAL NEWS

◆ Last November some of us attended a meeting, in Garden Grove, of the Dept. of Fish and Wildlife. Mike Godfrey has called to my attention that another such session in Southern California is scheduled for Nov. 15th. Since our response last year was so meager we'll let CCA, Wild Oceans etc. represent our interests. There are a variety of topics on the agenda, among them Marine Debris & Pollution, electronic reporting of landings etc. If you are interested in going call me for directions.

◆ Ready for some good news? Last month we reported on some excellent catches of salmon in Alaska. The Alaska Dept. of Fish & Game estimates that 58 million sockeye made the run last year - the third highest since 1960.

It isn't just salmon in Bristol Bay. NOAA reports that of 473 species just 16% are now considered overfished. Since 2000 NOAA's fish stocks Sustainability Index has nearly doubled. 2014 numbers brought in \$153 billion sales and this accounted for 1.39 million US jobs. This number includes imports. We need to recognize that this took about 60 years to achieve. After the WWII until 1974 stocks were depressed due to overfishing and foreign hauls. In 1976 we saw the passage of the Magnuson-Stevens act. Federal management took over the 200 mile offshore fisheries and regional managements set catch limits. The law was further strengthened in 1996 and again in 2006. These numbers were in TIME magazine.

Fish managers are still working on securing our future production by working on such problems as by-catch, ocean pollution and climate change issues. An editorial in a recent issue of Saltwater Sportsman notes in particular that the Florida and Gulf fisheries are suffering from polluting runoff blamed on human activities.

◆ Pacific Coast Sportsfishing, in case you have not seen it, had a report by Bill Roecker on 9 lady anglers who scored with supercows. These are tuna over 300 lbs. Cathy Needleman's trophy fish came off a 2013 trip on the Independence. She reported that this was a kite fish which pinned her to the rail during the over an hour fight. Delayed Congrats!

◆ IN CASE YOU MISSED IT!

A recent article in Western Outdoor News reported that local sportfishing boats may now apply for licenses to again fish Guadalupe Island. Since it was declared off limits by Mexican authorities years back – as a nature preserve – long range boats have had to bypass the “lupe”. The island, about 200 miles off San Diego, was always a surefire destination for excellent catches of tuna and yellowtail. Volcanic in nature, with rugged peaks it also offered shelter if during a trip your boat wanted to escape rough seas.

Only several boats have been issued permits so far, Royal Polaris, Royal Star and the Shogun, and the article did not define what future plans are open to others. The picture shows the majestic southern rocks which became known as “Tuna Alley”. Permitted boats are required to check in at Ensenada both going to and returning from Guadalupe.

Tarpon Fishing in Costa Rica

My good fishing buddy Allan Gordon and I decided that we should revisit the Silver King Lodge in north eastern Costa Rica. We were there several times some years ago, and as hard as we tried, couldn't remember why we stopped going.

We departed on Alaska Air's non-stop to San Jose, had a nice walk around the capital and a traditional Costa Rican dinner of steak, lobster and rum. Then to sleep before our



five am shuttle to the airport and a short cessna flight to the Rio Colorado.

The Silver King Lodge is located on the border of Costa Rica and Nicaragua. It's a beautiful resort literally carved out of the rain forest. After settling into our cabin, we had breakfast of rice, beans, fruit and eggs to order. Next was the orientation about the fishery and, of

course, the giant tarpon. Off we went to meet our guide Roberto, check out the tackle (all provided by the lodge) and make our way through the river mouth to the ocean. We were lines-in-the-water by 9:00 am.

The first strike was at 10am. We knew it was big immediately and was bigger after it jumped three times. These tarpon are strong. It took 45 minutes to get it close to the boat and another 45 minutes to get it to the leader. Roberto expertly popped the size 10.0 circle hook and off swam the 175-pound monster. That was it for us for our first morning. Tire and happy, we headed in for lunch.

The lodge serves wonderful food, three meals a day, has an open bar (all inclusive) and a friendly and helpful staff.

After a short nap, we were back at it. Allan nailed a hundred-pounder at about 2pm, and I got a 150 lb giant to end the day. Absolutely amazing fishing and catching!!

The lodge has a nice swimming pool and jacuzzi. It also provides for massages. All were enjoyed by both of us.

Day two was similar with 3 more tarpon ranging from 100 to 175 pounds. These fish know how to fight!!! Tarpon in Costa Rica are protected by law, so everything is catch and release. A great idea that will protect the fishery forever!

The weather was rough the next day. We had more rain that morning than Southern California gets in two years.

We finished up with a sunny afternoon and a beautiful boat ride up the river. Everything is green, green, green. Saw Howler monkeys, Cayman crocodiles and lots of species of tropical birds.

On our final morning, we packed our clothes (all of which were clean, since the lodge provides complimentary daily laundry service), had breakfast and caught our plane for the short flight back to San Jose. I returned late that afternoon to Los Angeles and Allan continued on to Panama for a tour of the canal etc.

This was a great trip. I recommend it to all and hope to go back again next year.



Redfish Lodge

Imagine being surrounded by acres and acres of salt water marsh, with not another boat in sight. A large stand of 300 to 500 year old oak trees face you in the distant from the adjacent island. The rain shower that just passed through produced a full rainbow. Eagles and herons are in flight. And the fish are biting.

This is what John Ballotti and Chas Schoemaker experienced on a recent fishing adventure to the Gulf area of Texas. Redfish Lodge is about a 45 minute drive from Corpus Christi. The lodge is situated on a mile long peninsula that stretches into the Texas Gulf area, allowing access to inshore saltwater fishing.

The lodge itself is a well appointed corporate retreat with a location that allows access to multiple fishing areas with a minimum of drive time. Because it is on a peninsula, it also features around the clock fishing if one so desires. The

choice is either the 1300 foot dock, or a lighted area on the other side of the narrow peninsula. Fishing from the dock, we caught and released speckled trout, flounder, black drum, perch, saltwater catfish, croakers, and a redfish.

The accommodations are clean and comfortable. The food is delicious, including a redfish dinner with a fish that had been caught earlier that day. Returning to the lodge after our first day of fishing, we were treated to a shrimp boil, Spread out over a 20 foot roll of butcher paper on a long table was a Texas shrimp boil, which also included blue crab, potatoes, corn and other delectable goodies.

Flats fishing was a new experience for both of us. Fishing was from about 7 am to 2 pm. A short drive in the lodge van brought us to Goose Island, where

we were met by the various guides with their many styles of boats. Two massive airboats made an impressive appearance. Our guide Brian Holden preferred a 24 foot Majek, a Texas made center console with a 250 hp Yamaha, that got us wherever Brian wanted to be in a hurry.

The fishing gear supplied by the lodge was spinning reels with 14 pound test spectra and a short

leader with a circle hook. Depending on conditions, either a chunk bait or one of several types of live bait, such as

croakers or piggy perch, might be used.

The difference between flats fishing and our normal west coast party boat fishing was a matter of different universes. Specially constructed boats for the flats operated in the 2 feet of water that covered most of the fishing grounds.

Depending on circumstances, fishing could be the middle of the channel or right up on the edge of one of the numerous islands in the marsh area.

At one point we were fishing in the middle of hundreds of acres of water, with no other boats in the area. Parts of the marshes are a bird preserve. In addition to being an excellent fish finder, Brian was an expert birder as well, identifying various hawks, egrets, and herons as they flew past.

One unique feature for the Southern California contingent was we actually needed our rain gear, as wet stuff was falling from the sky. This is of course normal in other parts of the country, but we are from the area where there is an ongoing record drought, so this was a treat for us. So was the rainbow that we were facing while we were catching fish.



Local knowledge is invaluable, and our guide Brian has been with the lodge for 23 years. He had plenty of knowledge to share about the conditions and techniques. For example, one day the primary approach was live bait in the channels. Another day was laying a piece of chunk bait almost on the shore of the Island.

The reason for the difference in technique is that the live bait can swim in the open waters. However, late in the season, the underwater aquatic growth near the shore dies off, falling in upon itself and forming a loose mat of dead growth and vegetation. A live bait dives for cover and hides in the weeds, becoming inaccessible to the targeted species of fish and tangling the line in the process. Chunk bait, on the other hand, near the shore sits on top of the vegetation, allowing a hungry redfish to swim along and gulp it into its open mouth.

The primary species targeted during our stay were speckled trout and redfish. As one might expect, there are dots, similar to a brown trout, on the

speckled trout, but the speckled trout has an interesting small fang like tooth in its upper jaw. Most of the people at the lodge were Texas natives who were looking forward to fish fries in their backyard when they returned home with their delicious filets.

Redfish are at the top of the food chain

fish for this area, and are the premier targeted species (and harder to catch). Redfish have a slot limit of 22 inches to 28 inches, with a daily bag limit of three. Redfish are normally not a volume catch. They take drag and pull, and can be a lot of fun.

A redfish over 30 inches is considered a trophy. It of course must be released as it is over the slot limit. A nice feature of the Redfish Lodge is a wall at the lodge of plaques in the shape of a fish with your name on it if you catch a 30-inch or above redfish. On our first day John made the list with a 31 ½ inch redfish, while I snuck in with a 30 incher. We had a very good day on our second day as well, with the size of the big fish reversed for the anglers.

Connecting flights on Southwest or American at Houston or Dallas will get you to Corpus Christi. The lodge can arrange for a shuttle to meet you at the airport. More information can be found at redfishlodge.com.

CALLING ALL COOKS

Usually this column deals only with fish, but I love this dish and have to share it. Guests always ask how much cream is in this. NONE. They are amazed. It is very creamy and does not need potato for thickening.

The soup is made with three ingredients, about a quart of vegetable or chicken stock, 3 leeks or a combination of leeks and onions, and a large head of cauliflower. I Use a little oil to start sautéing the leeks and the seasoning is salt and pepper. The quantities are guides and the ratios can be varied.

Start by trimming away the dark green portion of the leeks and discard. Slice and thoroughly rinse the leeks. They are sandy. Put them in a stockpot with a little oil and cook them on medium heat till translucent. While the leeks or onions are cooking, break the cauliflower into florets. If you want to take the time, you may roast them before adding them to the pot, but it is not necessary. When the leeks are cooked add the cauliflower, and stock. Use enough stock to cover the cauliflower. Cook over medium heat. Do not let the bottom scorch as the soup will taste burnt.

When the cauliflower is tender, add some salt and pepper to taste. Use less rather than more as you can correct the seasoning after it is processed.

In a blender, process the soup in batches till it is fully pureed. Taste, season and reheat. If the soup is too thin, cook it uncovered to reduce it, if too thick thin it with more stock. I like it thick. I have toyed with the idea of adding curry, but have not yet tried it. If any of you adventurous souls try it, let me know how it turns out.

This soup freezes well. Bring it to a low boil before serving it after freezing to restore the texture.
