You will frequently see him giving a separate seminar to the new or less experienced anglers on his trips and tips as the trip progresses to assure everybody has a great time and everybody catches fish. He'll always be hooking and handing fish and taking photos.



Larry and his incredibly patient and understanding wife, Marie, are retired and live in Playa del Rey. They enjoy traveling and scuba diving to exotic locations, ie, when he isn't fishing.

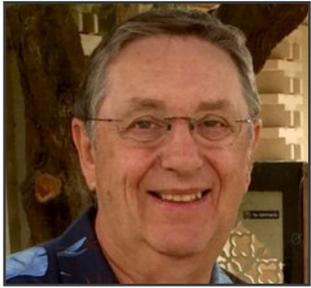

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Family Fishing Charter On The Monte Carlo

The first LARRC sponsored Family Fishing Charter took place Sunday, September 20 on the Monte Carlo. The boat left 22nd Street at 6:30 a.m. filled with 20 eager young people and 20 adults. At the bait receiver, the crew loaded up with large, lively sardines. The skipper decided to go for yellowtail given the available bait. The weather was warm and the seas were flat. The boat anchored above some rocks after a short boat ride and set up a chum line. The yellowtail did indeed show up. There was a steady, but never wide open, yellowtail bite throughout the morning. These were quality fish in the 12 to 20 pound size range. The crew of the Monte Carlo was awe-

some in getting the yellowtail to bite, handing off the rods to young people, and then coaching them while they fought the fish. For many of the young people, this was the first time they had a chance to play with a real game fish. Some good size bonito were also landed. The sweet spot was 100 feet behind the stern of the boat; the ticket was a fly lined lively sardine. There was not much action along the sides of the boat or on the bottom (Fish and Game has closed the sculpin season). The boat was accompanied by several enormous and cagey sea lions that were adept at sardine snacking. I did learn that sea lions generally avoid a sardine hooked behind the anal fins while they surgically excise the rear half of a sardine hooked through the nose! My granddaughter Charlotte won the jackpot by landing a 20 pound yellowtail late in the morning while her family cheered her on – an experience that I’m sure will be etched in her memory! This charter provided a fun intergenerational experience and I hope it becomes a LARRC tradition.

MENTORS TRIP DRAWS KUDOS FROM THE KIDS





1st LARRC Vets Fishing Trip a Huge Success-22 Yellowtail

Fishing aboard the Betty O, 4 LARRC Volunteers and 15 Vets had an amazing trip on Tuesday, September 29th. Steve Simon, LARRC volunteer coordinator, Donald Goldsobel, Joe Mahfet, and Phil Bell, joined Chaplain Dov, and 15 enthusiastic vets on a spectacular day of fishing. We caught 22 Yellowtail with a few assorted rock fish and barracuda in the mix.

We went out about 6 miles from MDR to the short bank. At first we were using dropper loop set ups and fishing deep. We caught a few nice yellows but the bite turned off after about an hour. Then one of the deck hands hooked a beautiful yellow fly lining, so we switched to fly line set ups and the reel fun began. We had 3 hours of non-stop surface action using sardines for bait. These were quality fish weighing between 18 and 25 lbs.

Many of the Vets said these were by far the largest fish they had ever caught. Often, a LARRC volunteers would hook a yellow and hand it off to a very excited Vet. Then the fun began. One of the 3 deck hands or a volunteer would coach the vet until the yellow was brought to gaff.

The crew consisting of Captain Mike, his wife Patty the galley chef, and the deckhands Mikey, Bradley, and Chris all did a fabulous job. Everyone brought home an extremely heavy bag of filleted yellowtail.

The LARRC Board should be applauded for voting to sponsor these trips that honor our nation's veterans in a very special way. The next trip is scheduled for Tuesday, October 20th on the Betty O out of MDR from 7 AM to 3 PM.

CALLING ALL COOKS

In the past, I gave you my favorite way to make tuna salad from poached yellow tail or yellowfin tuna. Poach, mash, chill, add capers, mayo and onion. I tried something new. There is a product available, maybe from Trader Joe's, a green olive paste. I got mine at Valley Produce. It also comes in kalamata and generic black olive form. I used the green olive paste mixed with lower calorie mayo. It is VERY INTENSE. Use it sparingly. It has great flavor. I can see it as an ingredient in hor's devourers.

BTW Last night I made hor's devourers of home smoked tuna, cream cheese, capers, and a bit of milk to thin it, all in a mini food processor till smooth. Great on crackers or mini toasts.

And now for our monthly recipe(s).

HERE IS THE EASIEST FRESH TUNA RECIPE EVER!!!!

Prep sauce first....see below

Cut fish into equal size cubes or rectangles...
 Roll tuna or like fish in
 Sesame oil salt and pepper
 Get grill...hot...hot...hot
 Prep large bowl of ice water by BBQ...
 Sear tuna on each side for one minute or less....Do not over cook!!! Leave raw in center
 Throw in ice water immediately to stop cooking.....

You can slice and eat, but it is better if you can wrap each piece in a paper towel and put in fridge for one hour to "relax"

Slice thin.....

Kikkoman makes a prefab Ponzu sauce that is okay (it is Ponzu and soy) that you can get at most markets...there are others as well...the mixed ones are brown in color.....or you can make your own...Real Ponzu is a clear citrus found in the Japanese row of the market...you can take that and mix it with soy sauce (70/30 soy to Ponzu), ginger fresh sliced is best, garlic (powder or fresh) and diced green onions...it is best if you can make this ahead of time to sit and let the flavors mix....

Once you have mixed or have your sauce ready slice the fish, pour generous amounts of Ponzu over sliced fish and serve with fresh wasabi.....

Nancy Culbertson sent this super tasty suggestion: A simple, but tasty, modification of the typical seared ahi is to substitute ground coriander instead of pepper or sesame seed.

Tonight we will be enjoying broiled wahoo steaks with Mrs. Dash's salt free lemon pepper marinade, accompanied by steamed asparagus and couscous. Hoping to replenish our supply of wahoo aboard the Red Rooster III the first week of November.

Jim O'Donnell Shares a recipe for Seared Ahi Tuna with Maui Onion Dressing

Harry Soo, host of Slap Yo Daddy BBQ published this recipe and Jim O'Donnell, tried it, loved it, and made it three times. This is how Harry Soo introduced the recipe.

"Native Hawaiians used to fish for tuna using their wooden ocean faring canoes. They would use jungle twine as fishing line and bones in the shape of fish hooks. When they hooked up a tuna, the powerful fish would run the line out so fast that when the line draped across the wooden canoe, the friction set the canoe on fire. They would have to douse the fire with seawater.

Ahi is the Hawaiian word for fire, hence the name Ahi Tuna. The tuna is actually from the yellowfin tuna species and the yellowfin from Hawaii has a characteristic deep crimson red color.

I make this dish whenever I miss the islands. My recipe was featured in a Hawaiian magazine in the 1980's and has become one of my signature dishes as it is a crowd favorite even among those who shy away from raw fish.

Jim makes it whenever he wants it.

Ingredients

Sashimi Grade Tuna

SYD All Purpose Rub

Jim makes his own spice rub with paprika, brown sugar, garlic powder, onion powder, chili powder, cumin, cayenne, kosher salt and black pepper. " I don't measure but it's about 1/2C of paprika and a tablespoon of everything else (closer to 2T of kosher salt"

Extra virgin olive oil

Dressing

1/4 cup light soy sauce
1/4 cup Japanese rice wine vinegar
1 tbsp. honey
1 tsp Japanese Shichimi pepper blend (red chili pepper you see in all Japanese restaurants; use cayenne as substitute)
dash of pepper
pinch of Kosher salt
1 tbsp. Japanese sesame oil
1/2 cup finely chopped Maui onions

Garnish

Radish sprouts
Black sesame seeds
White sesame seed



Instructions


Soak tuna overnight in ziploc bag drizzled with extra virgin olive oil (this secret step will tenderize the tuna).

Remove tuna from bag.

Dust with medium sprinkling of SYD rub. Sear on hot saucepan 60 seconds each surface.

Pour dressing on serving plate.

Slice tuna about pencil thick and lay in circular pattern. Garnish with radish sprouts and sesame seeds.

MEMORANDUM TO CALIFORNIANS

A recent meeting with one of our Chum Line editors, Donald Goldsobel, is the reason for the submission of this article. It is not an original writing but another piece of information touching on the state of our fisheries. Credit for this goes to a lady much involved working on behalf of our recreational fishery for Wild Oceans. Formerly known as National Coalition for Marine Conservation, Wild Oceans was given a grant by our foundation last season. Theresa Labriola is the West Coast Fisheries Project Director for this organization and her experience occasioned these comments.

While California is well known as a leader in environmental matters, its efforts to protect the ocean environment from indiscriminate drift gillnet fishing has fallen way short. Normally the impacts of such destructive fishing have been curtailed or outlawed in many areas. The US has passed some laws restricting the size of such nets. New Zealand banned them altogether as did the European Union in 2002 and they are off limits in the Mediterranean. This year even Vladimir Putin announced that Russia will prohibit drift gillnets in his country's waters.

The US has a patchwork of laws leaving it to the regional councils to regulate them. Washington and Oregon banned them for sharks and swordfish. In the Atlantic the National Marine Fisheries Service has enforced coastwide prohibitions to protect migratory fisheries since 1999.

California is swimming against a global tide! The Pacific Council is clearly in need of updating their rules in order to do away with the continued economical and ecological costs. This destructive gear needs to be replaced with safer and "greener" alternatives. The west coast stands out as one of the places where such nets are still allowed.*

ITEMS OF INTEREST....

1- The PFMC (Pacific Fisheries Management Council) meets in different areas along the west coast. Their next meeting is scheduled for Nov. 14-19 at the Hyatt Regency Hotel, 11999 Harbor Blvd. Garden Grove, CA. It would be important for us to work with larger organizations to effect changes.

2 - A US Court of Appeals in San Francisco rejected a challenge to 2013 law that forbids the possession, distribution or sale of shark fins.

3- In 2014 Alaska's portion of frozen king crabs was 21.1%. Russian Imports were 72.3% Ref. National Fisherman Oct. 2015.

It all started back in March at the Fred Hall Show. We have been interested in fishing for giant Atlantic Bluefin and Gary Quon (Tady Lures) knew who the best outfitter is through his friend and wanted us to meet them. Gary introduced us to Kil Song from Blackhole fishing rods and their pro-staff Scott and Jennifer McCall. Scott and Jennifer mentioned they had openings for their charter in September and we jumped at the opportunity! This fishery is highly regulated and we thank them for it. It is catch and release only for recreational anglers and you have one hour to leader the fish or you must cut the line. This way it doesn't put unnecessary stress on the fish and they are able to recover from the fight. I believe commercially, it is one fish per tag per boat per year and it is caught on rod and reel just like recreational anglers.



*Just a bit of planning advice, try to fly from LAX to an East Coast destination and maybe hangout for a day or two. Our flight departed at 11:45am and landed at 7pm in Montreal with our connecting flight at 9:10pm. This sounds like enough time, but it's not. You must go through immigration, get your luggage then customs, recheck your luggage and then run (we literally ran) to the next terminal with 10 minutes to spare. We met Mel on our flight and he had to run with his rod and reel cases. It was intense and we all made the flight a bit sweaty and out of breath.

We landed in Charlottetown around midnight, picked up our rental car and made our way to Rollo Bay Inn. Luckily, I planned to have Tuesday to rest and see the island before fishing Wednesday, Thursday and Friday. It was driz-




zling and a perfect day to have a lobster sandwich at the Lobster Shack in Souris and drive around. The island is a beautiful, lush green farming town with the small

town vibe and friendly people! What a big change from the San Fernando Valley!

Wednesday morning, woke up bright and early to meet

the guys from Tightline Tours at the harbor. Spencer was our captain and Kiren his first mate. The boat was comfortable with an open back deck and an enclosed cabin, a little different from the boats we fish at home. We came to our first spot and immediately started chumming herring to bring the fish up. It was amazing!!! The water was super clear and you could watch

the bait drop down and then a huge, I mean HUGE, bluefin tuna would swim by and eat the bait. It was a pattern and you could count how many fish were there and size them up. We put a bait in the water and hoped a big one would bite. We lost the first two fish (pulled the hook and line snapping) and then we were on! I got strapped in to the harness and fighting plate (which I have never used before) and they hooked the rod and reel to me. WOW!!!! What an amazing feeling, the line screaming off the Avet T-RX spooled with 200lb braid, 200lb mono and 180lb fluorocarbon leader. Having never understood why anyone would ever need 100lbs of drag, however it was soon to become clear



that not only do you need 100lbs you quite possibly need more to slow down these magnificent fish. I felt awkward and clumsy as the boat pitched with the type of seas one might expect from the North Atlantic Ocean between Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island. Captain Spencer had a hand on my harness strap just in case the fish pulled a bit too hard and I braced myself against the boat and trusted the harness. It was amazing, the fish would run and we would chase with the boat and me reeling trying to get line back. The hardest part was towards the end, when the fish was straight up and down. It was difficult to lift the



rod over the corners of the stern. I did it though!! We lea-dered the fish and brought my personal best of 570 lbs to


the side of the boat. We took tons of pictures, hoping one would be good and we slowly trolled the fish along the boat until it kicked and swam away. It was an experience of a lifetime!

Thursday was Kevin's day! He was first on the rotation, harnessed up and ready to go! He rocked it! It was much easier for him to fight the big fish in a harness instead of using the rail. It was great to have Scott there to coach him on how to use the gear and drag instead of trying to muscle the fish. Kevin's fish was about 850lbs! He worked that fish quickly and got it to leader



in 45 minutes. We got great pictures of him and his fish then released him back to the sea.

Friday was our last day and we decided to team fight our last fish. Kevin went first and got back all the pink fins spectra, I went second and got back all the white spectra and Jennifer finished it off bring back all the mono, flouro and leader! This one was about 900lbs. much longer and wider than the previous fish! It was great fun and we took a fun group picture!



Scott and Jennifer are our big fish mentors and we learned so much from them, if they are in the area I will try to have them be a speaker at one of the dinner meetings!

If you want to experience something out of this world and completely different from our typical west coast fishing, go to Prince Edward Island and check out this one of a kind fishery. We got the bug and are booked for next year with our awesome new friends!!

Royal Star 7 Day Adventure

Several LARRC members boarded the Royal Star on September 26 for a seven day long range trip anticipating tight lines and full fish holds. With fish located in so many places near and far there was much speculation where we would fish and how soon lines would go into the water.

The San Diego bait receiver provided a load of beautiful large sardines and small mackerel. As the boat cleared Point Loma, Captain Brian Sims held the mandatory safety briefing and the eagerly awaited fishing plan. To the surprise of everyone, Captain Sims said the boat was headed for Alios Rocks and our anticipated arrival time would be mid-day two days hence. Travel time was spent preparing tackle for the upcoming wahoo wars as well as catching up on reading materials and sleep. The weather was so good, if you didn't look outside, the boat could still be in the harbor. More on the weather later.

The day and a half spent at the Rocks yielded fan-

tastic wahoo fishing. Seventy speedsters were boated with four times as many hooked and lost. Both bait and jigs were effective as the bite was consistent and spread out around the area.


Through it all the passengers and crew maintained a positive attitude. The exceptional galley fare went a long way keeping spirits up during the long periods of slow fishing.
