### THE FUTURE OF RECREATIONAL FISHING!:

The inability of the long-range fleet to fish Guadalupe

Island this summer affected anyone on a five-day or longer trip. With offshore fishing spotty at best, the inability of the fleet captains' to fish this proven producer left many passengers frustrated and wondering if it is worth it to do the same next year. While Mexico is planning to issue permits allowing our boats to fish the island, the process is complicated at best and borderline dysfunctional. OK maybe not borderline. There is talk of making all the islands of the Baja Pacific coast aquatic biospheres. Imagine the Coronados, San Martin, Geronimo, Benitos, Cedros and Natividad all undergoing the permit process we are presently experiencing with Guadalupe. To make things worse, as with Guadalupe, there is the possibility that all fishing is prohibited until the permits are issued. If the current process is an indicator of

the future, it will be a quagmire of epic proportions. Needless to say, the prospect of fishing the islands by permit or a complete closure of island fishing not only has an impact on recreational fishermen, but also the long-range fleet which derives its' livelihood from their ability to attract clients to these fish producing areas. Couple this with the MLPA initiative we have going on in California and the future of recreational fishing is tenuous at best. That is not to say recreational anglers do not support conservation and environmentally friendly initiatives. We do and we are often leaders in this area. What we oppose are decisions made based on unsubstantiated biased research or a bureaucratic process so hopelessly mired in red tape and doubletalk that it is self-defeating. What are we to do? Do not give up or give into the tendency to feel that nothing can be done. Organizations that represent recreational and commercial fishing interests are hard at work trying to right the ship both in Mexico and California. They have a Herculean task and being the optimist that I am, I believe in the end common sense and good judgment will prevail. We must remain hopeful and united. ■

# THE FOUR "Cs" OF FISHING

Lynne "The Knife" Ballew writes about the Club July 21-26 Trip

**T**here are many ways to measure the quality of a particular fishing trip. According to Dave Levinson, this year's esteemed Charter Master of the *Qualifier 105* trip, a good fishing trip is measured by the Four "C"s in this order, Climate, Company, Crew and Catch. This is a good philosophy to have, since this year (as last year) we were lucky to have the first three in abundance and the fourth in moderation. I am thrilled to have had the first three "Cs" this year and last, and remind myself that the three years prior (2003-5) we had all four "Cs" in abundance. Here are a few notes about the four "Cs" of the 2007 Charter.

**CLIMATE** – The entire trip we had very pleasant weather. We were as far south as Cedros Island and we were still never bothered by overly hot weather. The seas were calm making our abundant motoring time spent hunting for fish, pleasant. I shamefully did not watch one sunset. The moon was bright all five nights, therefore stargazing was not at its best.

**COMPANY** – aboard this year were 18 of the "Usual Suspects" Me, **Tom Carlisle, Abe Cohen, Brad Felger, Dan Felger, Bob Horowitz, Scott Lashbrook, Eli Livnat, Dave Levinson, Ray McIntosh, Larry Methvin, Frank Polak, Eric Rogger, Sam Rubinfeld, Al Scow, Ben Susman, Todd Thibodo, and Julian Wolf.** New suspects this year: **Rob Baldwin, Shelly Fried, Dave Permut, Christy Puente, Allen Rishe and Marvin Smith.** Christy Puente, Larry Methvin's daughter, took Julie

Smith's place as the other of two women traditionally on this charter. We all had a blast with the usual chiding, reading and games. Without usual charter attendees Jamie Smith and Sean McKenzie the amount of "Aggravation" playing was kept to a minimum, thus, this became the year of the gin game. Sam Rubinfeld and Al Scow's usual corner on the gin playing market turned into turned into 4 or 5 games being played at any one time. Wednesday night we celebrated Dave's 75th birthday one day early. The crew led by the able Capt. John Klein came in and sang the following lovely hymn to him. "Hymn, Hymn, (omitted word that rhymes with schmuck), Hymn. It was a wonderful group. As usual I felt depressed pulling out of the parking lot knowing that it would be another year until our microcosm would once again grace the tuna and albacore hunting grounds.

**CREW** – We always have a wonderful crew on board the *Qualifier 105*. This year for the first time during the 5 years that I have been going on the charter, owner **John Klein** ran the boat. John started the charter off by presenting Dan Felger with a nice Accurate reel in reward for his many years as Charter Master. The crew, including the cooks, was fabulous. Perhaps the best we have ever had. In addition to the usual help with gear and bringing in fish, all were especially helpful during our abundant line tangles. In my article last year I suggested that the faux pas I committed last year would not be my last—you should have placed your bets on that one.

Four people, each on a fish, were tangled. The crew helped untangle us but in the process two of us lost our fish. Whenever my dad, **Ben Susman**, finishes with his most recent successful catch he always looks up to me to see if I am on a fish and says "what are you doing Lynne?" This time I answered with the story of the four way tangle and finished with ..."luckily I was on my spectra so I didn't lose my fish". John Klein, witness to my most recent faux pas, has now and forever dubbed my Lynne "The Knife" Ballew.

**CATCH** – The catch was O.K. but not great. The charter is generally designed for one day of albacore fishing and the rest for tuna. The great poetic justice is that one person on board who had never caught an albacore, **Allen Rishe**, caught the only albacore. He was a brave and valiant fisherman eating the heart to celebrate the loss of his albacore virginity. The other interesting catch was by Ray McIntosh, friend of club member Larry Methvin, who hooked and released a striped marlin. We traveled toward Cedros on the first day and night. The second day we continued south. Eric Rogger was ready to dub this trip "A Whale of a Trip" as we spent most of the day following whales in search of tuna. We ended the day with 27 yellowfin tuna (YFT), 28 yellowtail (YT) and one dorado. Dinner time found us about 70 mi. north of Cedros. Monday morning we woke to fishing at Cedros Island where we found calico and sand bass, sculpin, sheephead and 103 YT. Our big challenge here was to keep the sea lions from eating our bait before

# Fishing the Yukon

Every now and again a trip comes together just as you imagined. Such was my recent trip to Kluane Wilderness Lodge ([www.Kluanelodge.com](http://www.Kluanelodge.com)) on Wellesley Lake in Canada's Yukon Territory. LARRC members **Tom Carlisle** and his wife, **Cinda**, **Jim Carlisle**, **Rick Uribe**, Rick's long-time friend **John Cybulski** and I flew to Whitehorse, Yukon via Air Canada. We stayed overnight there and flew on to Wellesley Lake the next morning on a "50s" DeHavilland Otter float plane. The cloud cover was a bit low so our Pilot Ernie flew relatively low to the mountain tops. We had spectacular views of the scenery as well as a big Bull Moose in one of the many mountain ponds that carve up the slopes of the mountains. After arrival, we enjoyed a nice lunch and then off on the lake for some afternoon "catching". The lake is oval shaped and about 10 miles long and 5-6 miles wide. The water is very clear and cold. The first afternoon was great fishing and Jim (my skiff partner) had the hot hand. He landed about 8 lake trout on eight weight fly rods. For the next six days it was sleep, fish, eat, fish some more and start over the next day. June calls for sunshine almost 24 hours a day. We normally start the day with a 7:00 am breakfast, then fish, eat lunch on the boat, come in for dinner at 6:00 pm and out on the water till 11:00 PM or even later. There were times when our boat fish count was six to fifteen in the morning followed by an afternoon/evening bite for twenty or more. The count includes both Lake Trout and Northern Pike, The average size trout we got on flies was probably in the 8-10 lb range. The pike were very plentiful and eager to bite. Jim hooked one on the fly and while bringing it to the boat a follower joined the party and it was a "biggie". I dropped a fly on its nose and the fight was on. It weighed 18 lbs and 41" long. Beautiful fish.

All the fishing is catch and release with barbless hooks. In addition to Pike and Lake Trout, four world records for Lake White Fish come from Kluane Lodge. Fly fishing is our main attraction but in order to catch the Lakers over 25 lbs you have to fish deep. It is very difficult, and maybe impossible to get a fly to sink 50 plus feet to where the really big fish are at home. It is however easy to use conventional rod and reels set up with weighted line. Jim and I fished with lodge owner Brian Dak one afternoon and we each caught four fish over twenty pounds, and I landed one big one at forty. Fifteen pound mono was the leader line size.

Fly patterns and colors were typically dark combinations one

day, followed by bright yellow or red the next. That is why Tom and Cinda have a fly book with well over 200 flies and patterns. Jim is not far behind with a big fold out fly book loaded with big deceivers to small number 20 dry flies. Rick and skiff partner John also had great fun with the fly rods. God willing, we will all be back next June.... Big Al. ■
