# 15th Annual Lou Berke Fish Derby

April 5th, 2019 – was the 15th year of the Lou Berke Fish Derby for Special Needs Students. This was previously called the Lou Berke Trout Derby but inasmuch as Fish and Wildlife does not have trout, they supply us with catfish. This year we were given over 1,900 pounds of catfish for the students to catch.

The purpose of the event is to introduce the students to the enjoyment and fun of fishing. This year was tremendous - all students caught their limit of fish within 10 minutes, thanks to the placement of the net.

Upon arrival all volunteers and students received a T-Shirt. Before the students arrived at the lake, our army of volunteers put together all the rods and reels, cut up the baits, and set the rod holders along the edge of the lake. We had breakfast for all volunteers prior to the students arrival. For those students who were hungry, they were welcome to enjoy breakfast.

There was one volunteer for each student to help them catch the fish and then head to the fish cleaning station. All fish are cleaned and put in a bag with the student's name, then put on ice. With over 100 students participating the fish cleaning stations had their hands full (thank you John Vowels, Mike Godfrey and the students from Long Beach State University).

# Lou Berke Special Needs Kids Event

I have attended every Lou Berke event since its inception. Working with Steve Simon, John Vowels, Joe Mahfet, Joel Steinman, Scott Schiffman, John Goss, John Ballotti, Paul Varenchik, Mike Hartt and a few other dedicated club members has been rewarding because of their commitment to provide a wonderful and memorable experience that these children will hold onto for many years to come. It's also very emotional for many of the volunteers (some of whom have had tears in their eyes), as a child with autism, muscular dystrophy, or cerebral palsy has the experience of a fish pulling on the end of the line. We could not have a successful event without the volunteers on the day of the event.

What concerns me is the problematic annual need for volunteers to assist in the deployment and retrieval of the net. The day before the event at least **6-8** volunteers are required to wheel the net in the bin to the dock; secure one end of the net to the dock; deploy the net into the water across the lake, and secure it. This year, thanks to the Los Angeles Police Department's dive team, we ensured the net's secure position on the lake bottom. The number of volunteers to make the task easy and efficient is at least 8. On the day of the event, John Vowels could use help in the cleaning of the fish caught. This year, California State University Long Beach Marine Biology graduate students did a terrific job assisting John and me with the fish cleaning.

The day after the event requires the retrieval of the net that is much heavier because it's been in the water for at least 48 hours. More manpower is needed. **Ten-12** volunteers would make the job of retrieval; loading the net into the bins; wheeling the bin into the park's pool area, and unloading and spreading the net out to dry. It takes 2-3 days for the net to dry. Lastly, when the net is dry it needs to be gathered "bottom to top," and reloaded into the bin for storage at Hansen Dam. This task is made easier if **8-10** members volunteer.

I hope I have enlightened our members regarding the total effort it takes to make this event a success. In ensuing years, our members need to answer the call to volunteer for "net retrieval and storage" to make this event continually successful.



# ENVIRONMENTAL MATTERS

◆ **BRISTOL BAY - PEBBLE MINE UPDATE.** . . This column first reported on this issue about a year ago. To refresh your memories – as a result of the Exxon-Valdez oil spill disaster legislation was passed to protect Alaska’s coastal lines. Bristol Bay is one of those areas. It measures about 52,000 square miles and has been sought after by major oil and exploration companies. It is a major spawning area since it holds many of the headwaters in the area. Within this land area there are also possible sources of gold and copper which a number of companies have been anxious to access. Called the Pebble Mine it is feared that water contamination would affect the salmon spawning areas and have a negative affect on the life of local fishermen (both recreational and commercial) and other Alaskans living locally. The Army Corp of Engineers had called for all parties to submit Environmental Impact Reports by March 1st 2019. This was a sixty day period. Affected parties have now contested this instead asking for a 270 day response time. It is noted that the ramifications are so complex that more time is need. Stay tuned!

◆ **SEA LION DECIMATION.** . .Salmon runs in the Northwest have been severely impacted by sea lions decimating salmon returning and departing on their migrations. In 1972 the MMPA (Marine Mammal Protection Act) was passed protecting these predators. Their population in 1972 was estimated at 75,000. It is now numbered between 250,000 and 300,000. An amendment to the MMPA act was passed last December (2018) called the Endangered Salmon Predation Prevention Act (S3119) which allows for the creation of salmon safe zones. Detailed negotiations are made with each geographically affected state and may include up to 10% elimination of the sea lions.

◆ **FISHING LICENSE UPDATE.** . . Pacific Coast Sportfishing reports that annual fishing license sales have declined 55% since 1980. Author Erik Landesfeind notes that in 1980 2.2 million annual licenses were sold. Presently 1 million (2018) are sold which represents a small (.37%) increase. California has 2.6 million anglers who add 4.6 billion \$ to the economy. California Sportfishing League has been instrumental in support of recreational anglers.

◆ **CCA (Hurray)!** . .A number of CCA members fished San Diego Bay recently to help Hubbs Seaworld acquire some needed halibut broodstock. The fish will be quarantined then moved to a permanent home, their offspring cultured into juveniles and then released into the ocean. The CDFW assisted the recreational anglers assuring proper procedures. Readers: If you are not yet a member of CCA join now!



It was almost time to set up on the squid grounds and try to load up on them. But, as the fish gods would have it, I got this big strike. For the first 10 minutes, we thought it was a world record White Sea Bass. For the next 10 minutes, it was more likely a monster Yellowtail. The next 10 minutes covered the possibility of it being a Bat Ray, Seal or Blue Fin Tuna. None of those either. Captain Brandon finally proclaimed it to be a Giant Black Sea Bass. And so it was--a 180 pound Gigantic Black Sea Bass. After a good slap on the rear, it swam off peacefully to live another 50 years or so.

# What to Bring – Long Range Tackle Guidelines

As a charter master I am frequently asked, “What gear should I bring on the trip?” I am asked this by guys going on 5 day, 10 day and 16 day trips, and I am asked by people considering their very first long range trip thinking they may not have the right stuff and therefore shouldn’t go. Let me start by sharing I have anglers coming from all over the globe to experience San Diego long range fishing and show up with just their clothing and toiletries. All of them catch plenty of fish and have a great time. So, you can bring as little or as much as you want. Most anglers bring way too much.

So, let’s remind ourselves the base is zero; i.e., clothing, toiletries and personal items and a comfortable pair of Xtratuf or equivalent boots. All of the websites of all the long range boats have a section called Suggested Tackle, and they normally detail recommendations for 3-6 day, 7– 10 day trips and the longer 12 day and longer trips. Most of the websites suggest way too much gear, so read them critically and ask yourself if their guidelines make sense to you. For example, do you really need to change your fishing shorts EVERY FREEEERING DAY? Some anglers want to be totally independent and adhere to the website guidelines to bring a dozen torpedo sinkers each of 6oz, 8oz, 12oz and 16oz. I’d prefer to bring two pairs of fast dry fishing shorts and if necessary wash one while taking a shower, and bring ¼ of the suggested lead and buy more from the boat if I need to. Most guys have 20 – 30 jigs, but some have none and buy the two or three they may need from the boat and you know the boat will only sell you what is currently hot. If you apply this theory to everything you will save a ton of space, weight and money.

Rather than re-create the wheel we have pasted links for a few of the top tier boats. Click on their Suggested Gear and Tackle Header, select your trip length and start with this guideline.

Don’t buy a bunch of expensive gear if the expense precludes you from going on a fishing trip or booking the length of trip you desire. All of the top tier long range boats have excellent loaner gear and most provide it for FREE or charge just for the replacement line you use during the trip. They also have an on board tackle shop which sells everything you will likely need all at land based tackle store prices. They also know what is working this week and will sell you

only the items you need, only the quantity you’ll use and only the items that are catching fish.

If you do have plenty of gear, or have the budget to get more, there are some areas where these web site recommendations are lacking. I am a huge believer in redundancy. Catching is not non-stop on these trips. The fish often come through in waves, which means you must be in the water with the right gear at the right time to optimize your catch. But there is a lot that can GOWRONG to preclude you from being in the water. Say you hook a fish and lose it to a shark, sea lion, get sawed off by another fish, get caught under the boat, etc. It takes time to repair your gear and get back into the water. Even when you land a fish you may detect that your line is frayed from the fish’s teeth, from a tangle or scraping on rocks, rudders or propellers and you definitely don’t want to cast out again without fixing that problem. Without a redundant outfit you may have to take 2 to 10 minutes or longer putting new line or new hooks or jigs on your outfit. That wave of fish may be long gone. That might mean a fish opportunity lost. So, if you have the budget and interest I suggest having an additional one or two outfits in the weight classes and techniques which you will be using most. If you love fishing bait have redundant bait outfits. If you love fishing jigs have multiple jig set ups. If you love doing both plan to have redundancy in both areas. Having this redundancy will also save time switching back and forth if you want to try bait for a while and then switch to jigs. That said, let me remind folks you can hop on any of the top tier long range boats with no fishing gear and have a great time and catch a load of fish. Say you only own 3 appropriate outfits. Bring them but still ask the boat for a loaner set so you will cover all bases.

Other hints for comfort and saving space:


1. Big terry cloth towels are bulky and don’t dry rapidly. On longer trips they will get mildew funk. Buy a new-tech chamois type towel at a back packing store or website.
2. Replace any denim and cotton jeans and shorts with the new tech, fast drying items. Denim is bulky and does not dry.
3. Layering will keep you comfortable in all weather and wind conditions, so bring short sleeve and long shirts and pants of various weights you can incorporate together. Fleece shirts and pants you can wear under rain jackets and rain pants will cover you in all conditions.
4. Each evening I shower and put on the shirt I will be

- wearing the next day and the same light fleece sweat pants for the whole trip for my dinner & lounging.
5. Consider leaving your trolling gear at home and use the boat gear. It works great and saves a lot of space and weight.
  6. Go through all your tackle and tackle boxes and purge all items you have not used in 3 years. I see tackle boxes jammed with crap, which has no good use, has never caught a fish, will never catch a fish and gets in the way of the good stuff.
  7. If you get sea sick bring whatever works for you and have extra. The common drugs for this are Dramamine, Zolfran, Transdermal scopolamine, and Bonine. The Relief Band electric shock watch is pricey but worth every penny if it keeps you from getting sea sick. A new product developed by the British Royal Navy is Cinnarizine. You can buy it in Mexico but not in the US or Canada. It is a miracle drug and used all over the world..

**Conclusion**

You can sign up for any long range fishing trip on any of the elite San Diego sport fishing boats with zero fishing gear and be assured a great time. You can use the loaner gear provided by the boat. You can bring your own limited tackle and augment it with the boat's loaner gear. Or, if you have unlimited budget and space you can bring everything you own, of which you will only use a small portion of anyway. I recommend pairing your gear down to the basics and have some redundancy for your most used weight class and techniques to minimize your time repairing and switching gear and maximizing your time in the water, which is the only place you will hook a fish. Hope this helps. Now, let's all go fishing.

If you know you don't have one, send me an email too!! I will add you to my list if you aren't on there.




