
CAPTAIN ANDY CATES, RED ROOSTER III

A Message from the President

PLEASE GET YOUR VACCINE AND COME OUT TO FISH

As I wrote in my first column, people who fish inevitably think in seasonal images. This is the time of year when we renew our fishing license, take inventory of our tackle, see what reels need line or service, and start to plan for the upcoming trips, charters, and adventures as the weather warms. In this exceptional year, we need to add another task: decide to get a vaccination against COVID-19 as soon as possible, if you have not already done so.

If you were hesitant to get the vaccine because you wanted to wait awhile to assess its efficacy and safety that time period is over. The best data comes from Israel. Up to February 11th, 523,000 people in Israel had received the second dose of the Pfizer vaccine and only 544 nevertheless developed an infection with COVID-19. Out of the 544, only 15 needed hospitalization, eight in mild condition, three in moderate condition, and four in serious condition. There were no deaths. The protection rate is 99.9%. Since the peak of morbidity in Israel mid-January, there has been a 38% decrease in the number of patients in serious condition and

a 40% decrease in the number of deaths among the population aged over 60.

It's true that there can be some side effects to the vaccine, but these are well worth the benefit. The most commonly reported side effects, which typically last 1 – 3 days, were pain at the injection site, tiredness, headache, muscle pain, swollen lymph nodes in the same arm as the injection, and fever. More people experience the non-local side effects after the second dose than after the first dose. I experienced some of these symptoms myself after the second dose but 99.9% protection against getting COVID-19 and – more importantly – and against becoming an agent for the spread of COVID-19 is well worth the temporary discomfort.

Getting the vaccination enables us to come out of hibernation and go fishing. We can sign up for overnight trips, multiple day charters, long range trips, and fishing adventures involving airplanes and overnight lodgings. Let us jump start the beleaguered recreational sportfishing industry and look forward to future tight lines!

Fishing Rules Amendment

THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS APPROVED AN AMENDMENT TO THE FISHING RULES ALLOWING AN ALTERNATIVE MEASUREMENT OF FISH THAT CAN BE ENTERED IN THE RECORDS BOOK

Recognizing that an appropriate scale is not always available, and that there is a recognized and established alternate method to establish the weight of a properly caught fish, Section 5 of the fishing rules is amended is hereby amended to add section G:

Section G. In the event an accurate scale is not available, a properly caught fish may be measured by length and girth, using accepted and established formulae and charts. Those fish may be reported and be recorded in a separate section of the posted and published club records. Those fish shall not be eligible for trophies.

◆ **CONSERVING 30 PERCENT OF U.S. OCEANS AND LANDS BY 2030** - On January 27, President Biden signed an Executive Action on Tackling the Climate Crisis at Home and Abroad which focuses on addressing climate change as well as committing to the goal of conserving at least 30 percent of the nation's lands and oceans by 2030 (known as "30x30"). According to the Order, the Biden Administration will work to achieve this 30x30 goal by supporting local, state, private, and tribally led nature conservation and restoration efforts that are underway across America. Department of Interior will develop tools to account for the many innovative and effective ways that communities are conserving their lands and waters for current and future generations. The Order also states that the federal government must "improve access to recreation." ◆ **DUNGENESS CRAB AT RISK FROM OCEAN ACIDIFICATION**- A new study finds ocean acidification is already dissolving the shells and damaging the sensory organs of young Dungeness crab off the West Coast. <https://www.sciencedirect.com/science/article/abs/pii/S0048969720301200> This is the first study that demonstrates that larval crabs are already affected by ocean acidification in the natural environment. Scientists did not expect to find dissolution impacts to the crab larvae until much later in this century.

◆ **DANA POINT NAMED FIRST WHALE HERITAGE SITE IN THE U.S.** - This month, Dana Point became the first Whale Heritage Site in the U.S., a distinction it shares with Hervey Bay in Australia, the Bluff in South Africa and newly named Tenerife-La Gomera Marine Area in Spain. The designation acknowledges areas known for having cultural ties and respectful interactions with whales and dolphins.

◆ **THE CALL TO PROTECT BRISTOL BAY** - Bristol Bay tribes, local residents, businesses, fishermen and conservation organizations have joined together to protect Bristol Bay. They are seeking permanent protections from mining by establishing Clean Water Act protections to create an immediate safety nest and security for those who depend on Bristol Bay's wild Salmon and create a Bristol Bay National Fisheries Area. California Assemblymember Jim Wood Introduces AB 817 to Establish a 365-Day State Fishing License AB 817 Would Also Create a Mobile App to Make Fishing Easier and More Accessible

February 16th, 2021: California Assemblymember Jim Wood (D-Santa Rosa) has introduced legislation that would transition California's calendar-based fishing license to one that's valid for 365 days from the date of purchase. The bill would also include a mobile phone app designed to make fishing easier and more accessible for more people.

"It's time for California to abandon its antiquated fishing license sales system," Wood said. "Modernizing this to a full 365-day license from the date of purchase will encourage more Californians to fish and increase fishing license revenues that fund critical state fishing and conservation programs."

"Prior to 2020, annual license sales had experienced a decline starting in 1980 to the tune of 55 percent, while the state's population has increased over 60 percent since that time, Wood said. 'In 2020, California fishing license sales spiked upward due to increased participation in angling activities brought about by the Covid-19 pandemic, but the long-term trend is still downward.'"

In fact, while California has a population of more than 39.8 million people, one of the country's longest coastlines, more than 3,000 lakes and thousands of rivers and streams, it has the lowest fishing participation rate per capita in the country. A leading contributor to declining fishing participation rates is costly fishing licenses that are not valid for a full 365 days from the date of purchase.

"Past bipartisan support underscores the recognition by members of the State Legislature that California's outdated sport fishing license system does not properly serve anglers in the Golden State," said Wayne Kotow, Executive Director of CCA CAL. "Providing anglers access to a fishing license that provides greater value and technology that makes fishing more accessible is long overdue."

"This bill also complements the current California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW) R3 program," Kotow added. "R3 stands for Recruitment, Retention and

Reactivation of California anglers, and what better way to achieve these goals than to boost the value of a license purchased by an angler? It's kind of a no-brainer."

This is not the first attempt to pass such a bill in California. Just last year, Assembly Bill 1387, also proposed by Wood to establish a 365-day license, was taken off the docket in the fall legislative session due to COVID-19. Similar bills in years past also failed to pass, despite the fact that 14 other states have now transitioned to a 365-day license. According to Rob Southwick and Associates, a national marketing and economics firm which analyses fishing license sales throughout the country, their analysis suggests that states that offer a 365-day license are outperforming revenue of states that only offer a calendar-based license.

The proposed bill would also require the CDFW to create an app by which anglers can display sport fishing and hunting licenses on mobile devices. Several other states offer mobile phone apps that provide anglers information on fishing locations, regulations, fish stocking schedules, campground reservations and more. The bill would also allow anglers to sign up for automatic license renewals.

Under the bill's language, there will be no increase in the fee charged for the 365-day license versus a calendar license, and if passed, the 365-day license would go into effect on January 1, 2022.

California's sport fishing license remains among the costliest in the country, second only to the State of Washington. Since 1986, the price of California's resident annual fishing license has increased 216 percent, which is 41 percent greater than the rate of inflation. Today, the license costs 110 percent over the national average. California's 1 million recreational anglers contribute over \$4.6 billion annually to California's economy, a major contributor to outdoor tourism and jobs.

Wood was elected in 2014 and represents Assembly District 2, a Northern California district including 300 miles

of coastline and many state parks, lakes, rivers and streams.

French Fish Cassoulet Recipe

Stews don't generally come to mind when we think of fish dishes. However, a lunch on a river cruise in France several years ago changed my preconceptions when a delicious fish stew over rice was served for lunch. I raved about the food to the waiter and asked whether the chef could kindly provide the recipe. Nothing further happened for the rest of the trip. I was surprised and delighted to find the recipe shoved under our cabin door when we were packing to disembark.

Fish stews have several advantages. They are easy to prepare, can be easily scaled up to provide multiple meals, and store well in the refrigerator without losing their flavors. They work well with any firm fleshed fish such as yellowtail, dorado, or yellowfin tuna – these are fish that are well stocked in our freezers from previous fishing trips. Stews are a complete satisfying meal combining veggies, protein, and carbs.

Here is my American version of the chef's recipe.

- 1 can of Italian white beans "Cannellini" drained.
- 1 tablespoon of olive oil
- 6 carrots peeled and sliced
- 6 sticks of celery sliced
- 1 large onion sliced
- 1 large leek sliced (both green and white parts)
- 4 ounces cooked Canadian bacon sliced or
3 heaping tablespoons Bacos (vegetarian version)
- 1 tablespoon minced garlic
- 1 pound defrosted firm fleshed fish fillet cut into bite sized chunks
- 1 large can seeded peeled tomatoes
- 1.5 cups consommé
- 1 teaspoon salt
- ½ teaspoon freshly ground black pepper

Place all the ingredients well mixed in a Dutch Oven and bake in 350-degree oven for about 35 minutes. I like using the Dutch oven because it seals in all the flavors and moisture and requires no supervision. I recommend serving the cassoulet with basmati rice.


Got To See It To Believe It

Very strange things are always happening on fishing boats and the high seas. I've had wahoo crashing into the side of our boat, marlin or makos jumping aerial acrobatics 20 feet off the rail, thousands of whales, greater than any Nat Geo documentary for miles and miles, barn owls landing on the boat 100's of miles offshore, 2 anglers hooking and landing the same cow tuna, 2 wahoo hooked on one kite rig, recovering a buoy with a rod and reel still connected to a cow tuna, a storm of thousands of giant flying fish jumping on the boat driving anglers for cover and safety. Anyone of these is possible because I've seen it with my own eyes, but rare enough to be noteworthy.

I was on our 7 day Fall Royal Star adventure and experienced 3 weird events all on the same trip. I wouldn't believe it if I didn't see it with my own eyes. My buddy and

fellow LARRC member, Larry Diamant, hooked and landed a 165 lb bluefin tuna which still had a large flat fall style jig in its jaw. The jig looked very old and the wound in the tuna's jaw and side were deep and raw, but the beast was still eating, schooling with his buddies and fought a valiant battle, showing no weakness because of this bejeweled handicap. The jig bore a



deep groove in it from the wear and tear against the gill plate of the tuna. It also had a very large organic, animal growth which had attached itself to the jig and had grown to about 2 inches in size. All of this suggested the fish had been carrying the jig around for a very long time.

The jig also had Japanese lettering on it, but none of the anglers or crew members recognized the brand. This jig was not available from California retailers. Captain Tim sent photo's of the jig and deformed tuna to his buddies in the Tuna Science and Conservation circle and an immediate buzz was generated. How old was the



fish? Where was it first hooked? Was it hooked in Japanese waters before it's long migration to the Eastern Pacific? Japanese scientists and fishing enthusiasts joined the buzz and speculation.

The mystery remains unsolved but NOAA scientist and Pacific Bluefin tuna expert, Owyn Snodgrass, provided his best guess. From the size and calculated age of the tuna, the wear and tear on both the jig and the tuna's flesh and the size of the animal growing on the jig, Snodgrass guessed it was originally hooked in the Eastern Pacific by an angler who may have purchased the jig in Japan, and that the tuna had been wearing the jig for between 1 and 2 years. The size of the tuna suggested it had migrated from Japanese waters about 3 -4 years earlier at the age of 1 or 2.

On that same Royal Star trip, we saw a bunch of loose line in the water all around the side of the boat. We were yelling out "loose spectra, loose spectra" but typically everybody was in denial it could possibly be theirs. I snagged it just to be helpful and brought it over the rail. Nobody claimed it so I tossed it back thinking the angler will eventually realize his line is all over the place. Deck boss Captain Blake came over and again yelled "who's loose spectra is that?" Ever helpful, I snagged it again and Blake grabbed it and started to pull it in by hand. We saw the end of the

line in the water, like someone had just cut it off and dumped it, and nobody was claiming it. Then it became tight but it was all wrapped up in his hands. Danger!!! There was a fish on the terminal end. Blake is strong as an ox, and he was able to start wrapping the line around his elbows. His eyes got really big and he whispered "this is a big #%&@ing fish!" Blake starts barking orders to his crew. "Get a back up rod, get a kite rod, it can't be filled up." Deckhands are running around following Blake's instructions to cut and splice the line in the water to the line on the back up rod. Angler Courtney Wenzel was standing right there so Blake hands him the rod and screams "wind." By now Courtney has a gallery of cheerleaders, crew and fellow anglers. A half hour battle ensues before the beast is brought to gaff (4 gaffs) and hauled over the rail. We can't believe it. We are staring at a 180 pound tuna, which had been lost probably by another angler on another boat and Courtney has it on deck. It had been dragging around 100 yards of spectra and still eating. We're all laughing and high fiving. Good job Royal Star crew and congrats to Courtney. Strange stuff happens all the time.

So sure, strange things happen on boats, but not normally 3 on the same trip. We had been catching bluefin tuna earlier in the day but were on a very frenzied bite of school size yellowfin tuna. We all appreciate variety. Guys were yelling for gaff, the crew was busy gaffing, helping with tangles and tagging and bleeding fish. Nobody noticed the lone long finned albacore amongst the yellowfin tuna. In fact it wasn't noticed until Captain Tim Ekstrom saw it and immediately identified it as an albacore when they were unloading the fish for processing. He was so tickled he sent me the photo included herein. What was a lone albacore doing swimming with a large school of yellowfin tuna? Albies like cooler water and yellowfin like warmer water. Fish of different species do not normally school together. No other albacore had been caught all year.

None of the deckhands or anglers, including my buddy, Alex Bravo, the lucky angler whose tag was on the fish noticed it was an albacore. Maybe it was because we haven't seen albacore for 10 years and it was so out of context. Maybe, in the frenzy of the bite nobody noticed the obvious differences in color, body and fin length and shape.
