# A Message from the President

## THE AGONY AND THE ECSTASY

Here's a first: I can actually write about my fishing experiences this past month. The above title represents hyperbole – but whoever said hyperbole hurt the recounting of fish stories.

I went on the 2021 LA CCA Members Charter on the Amigo May 2nd out of 22nd Street landing. The boat went around the northern end of Catalina and fished the backside in the morning and the area in front of Twin Harbors in the afternoon. The weather was choppy and overcast in the morning, smooth and sunny in the afternoon. The crew was great but the fishing was poor. The boat's catch consisted of one short barracuda, one short calico, and two small sculpins. A pound and a half sculpin won the jackpot. The charter attracted 21 avid anglers who fished every method of fishing employed on our coast other than the kite. The fish weren't biting, even the deep-water rockfish were snoozing. However, this angling cloud came with a silver lining for me. At the end of the day, there was a raffle of swag on the way back and I won the grand prize – a nice Accurate rod in the 20 to 40 pound class (Accurate, noted for its fishing reels, has recently expanded its product line to fishing rods). This was a nice present for my birthday week! I was very impressed how the charter was organized and run. I would definitely recommend other LA CCA Members Charters in the future for participation by other LARRC members.

When I mentioned my lucky raffle win to Steve Simon, he told me that the LARRC Foundation had in its stash an Accurate reel that would make a nice match for the rod. So, I bought the Magnum Boss reel from the Foundation, filled with braid, and Steve threw in thirty yards of pink Spectra. Anxious to try out my new outfit, I booked an overnight on the Pac Dawn for mid-May.

On the way out, the deckhand Cody connected the braid to the pink spectra and tied a spider hitch at the end of the spectra. One 15" end of the line connected at a 4/0 circle hook with a live bait ring; the other end was three feet long and tied to a 12-ounce sinker. When the sun rose on May 17th, we were off the southern end of Santa Rosa, surrounded by five other boats trying to connect with white sea bass, including the Mirage, the New Hustler, the Ranger 85, the Aloha Spirit, and the Endeavor. The Ranger

85 had scored on live squid during the night, so we pulled alongside the Ranger 85 and received a generous infusion of dip nets full of live squid. Despite the availability of live squid, I decided to use two fresh dead squid on the hook instead. John Ballotti had recently enticed a 20-pound yellow-tail with this offering on a four pack, fishing alongside three other LARRC members who came up empty.

We were fishing in 75 feet of water and a strong current was running. White sea bass well deserve their nickname "the gray ghost." Sometimes they are very picky and reticent; other times they go into a feeding frenzy for a while. This morning they were picky. No one was getting bit and I could see no bent rods in the surrounding boats. Bouncing my squid slowly along the bottom, the bait stopped and then started moving out. I moved the lever drag a third of the way to the strike position. The new rod bent into an arc. Fish on! Ten minutes later the first white sea bass was on board. Captain Mike was enthusiastic that someone had broken the ice and pointed to my LARRC jacket, saying "Join this Club people!" After some photos I went back to fishing. Fifteen minutes later I got bit again. My rod and reel combo worked perfectly and a white sea bass larger than the first bounced aboard. The next fish to be caught was a nice halibut. The angler was overjoyed because halibut


is his wife's favorite eating fish and he had been trying for three years to catch one. Then another strong fish hooked up. This turned out to be a hefty yellowtail. Then the action stopped and after trying for an hour with no hook ups, the boat moved on to round out the day with rock fishing.

I had caught two white sea bass and the limit was one in May. Rather than turn myself into the CA Department Fish and Wildlife, I gave one of the fishes to cooking maven and LARRC member Donald Goldsobel. I was tempted to take a nap on the way back but I wanted to see who won the jackpot. My larger white sea bass and the yellowtail were almost exactly the same length, but the yellowtail was thicker and fatter. It was a great day for me and an excellent debut for my new fishing outfit.

# JOHN BALLOTTI APPOINTED TO ADVISORY PANEL

The California Department of Fish and Wildlife Director **Charlton Bonham** has appointed **John Ballotti** as a member of the Ocean Resources Enhancement Advisory Panel (OREAP) for a three year term.

In 1983, the Legislature established the Ocean Resources Enhancement and Hatchery Program (OREHP) [Fish and Game Code (FGC) §6590 et. seq.] to conduct a program of basic and applied research into the artificial propagation, rearing, and stocking of important marine fin fish species occurring in ocean waters off southern California. Initially, white seabass and California halibut were both chosen for use in the experimental stocking program; however, in 1990, research focused on white seabass because of the depressed condition of the stock at the time and its higher value to recreational and commercial fishermen.

The OREAP is a legislatively mandated advisory body that advises the Department's Director in establishing policy and direction, including the expenditure of fee revenue, for the Ocean Resources Enhancement and Hatchery Program (OREHP). The purpose of the OREHP is to determine if hatchery-released marine fin fish can enhance stocks of wild species through increased hatchery production of fish and to monitor fisheries to assess hatchery contributions. The OREHP statute, Fish and Game Code (FGC) Section

6590, was recently amended, updating the program's management processes and expanding the program's capabilities and public-private partnerships. Currently, the focus of the OREHP's research is on White Seabass (*Atractoscion nobilis*). The composition of the OREAP, as described in the amended FGC Section 6594, is comprised of the following members:

- One nonvoting member representing the Department. (**Kristen Ramey**)
- One nonvoting member representing the California Sea Grant program. (**Luke Gardner**)
- Two voting members representing the southern California commercial fishing industry. (**Rob Ross, Mike McCorkle**)
- One voting member representing the southern California commercial passenger fishing vessel industry. (**Alayna Siddall**)
- Three voting members representing the southern California sport fishing industry. (**John Ballotti, Jim Hendricks, Wayne Kotow**)
- One voting member representing the southern California aquaculture industry. (**Tony Vaught**)
- One voting member representing the public or non-governmental organization interests, or both. (**Rachel Lopez**)

That was the epiphany- we had absolutely no idea how to Bass Fish. So, we watched you tube videos.


5-28-21 Trip to Bob Sands to buy a new rig with the help of Buzz

Donald Goldsobel's  
**CALLING ALL COOKS**

My wife' Alice's family is from Minnesota and were all avid freshwater anglers. My Mother-in-law, Charlotte, was a great cook and used every morsel of every fish they caught. Alice despised eating any fish with bones. Charlotte responded with the most delicious fish cakes ever eaten. I thought the recipe was lost, but it turned out that the recipe was given to Alice's sister-in-law, Patty. After bringing home a batch of Whitefish from a trip on the Pac Dawn, I dragged out the recipe for a first effort. Whitefish is ideally suited to this recipe that is based on freshwater fish, bass and pike. I have Auntie Patty's beautifully hand written recipe. No list of ingredients, just a narrative of doing it. Here goes!

## FISH PATTIES

2# BASS OR FATTY FISH

2# NORTHERN (PIKE) OR DRY FISH

I made a half recipe of 2 pounds of fish and halved everything else.

*Sprinkle with kosher salt and let sit overnight in covered container. (Refrigerated)*

*Wash fish well at least 3 or 4 times under cold water to remove salt.*

*Run fish through meat grinder w/ 3 pieces of celery and 1 lg. onion - (If you are using hand grinder, you must run fish through twice) (I used a food processor and ran my two pound batch through in three separate runs. Do not over crowd the processor bowl).*

*In a large mixing bowl-*

*Beat 4-5 eggs - very well (3-4 minutes)*

*Into eggs add 1/2 cup Wesson Oil (I used grape seed oil. Any vegetable oil will be ok)*

*(Beat well again)*

*Then add- salt, pepper, 1 tsp sugar*

*Accent (all mixed in a little water 1/4 cup) add to eggs. (I left out the MSG, put it all in the processor with the*

*eggs and mixed it well)*

*Then add to fish mixture. Beat Well-*

*"Don, (she refused to call me Donald), don't be alarmed if it looks like too much egg- it won't be after you beat the mixture for 4 or 5 minutes.*

*With wet hands form into patties and sprinkle with a little matzoh meal. (You can use any kind of crumb if you have no matzo meal. I used an ice cream scooper for the patties and had a bowl of water at hand to keep hands wet enough so the fish does not stick your hands. I sprinkled the crumbs on a plate.)*

*Fry in hot oil, but not too fast, until golden brown*

(I used an electric fry pan set at 350 – grape seed oil to cover the bottom of the pan, but be on the conservative side with the oil. I used a thermometer to check that the inside was done, 132 degrees or higher. I served them with mustard. Fantastic!) They freeze well – use a flat pan to freeze and then put in a bag to keep in the freezer.)



# Michael Grossman: A Remembrance

When I first met Mike Grossman, he was an Internet persona on the fishing boards known as Hawk. He was legendary for his abilities to maintain and customize reels. His days as a movie studio entertainment attorney and mischievous student at Harvard were long behind him.

Michael lived up the street from where my office was in the valley. When I became president of the LARRC, Michael and Joel Steinman would meet with me for lunch on a regular basis at Gelson's. They freely shared with me their knowledge of the background and experience of the LARRC to help me be a better president.

In addition to fishing, Michael was a fine dining and wine enthusiast. Coincidentally, I once ran into Michael at Providence, where we both had spectacular meals.

Michael enjoyed being a wine connoisseur and had several particular small winery favorites. One year he had a conflict during some weekend when there was a VIP limited ticket event, so he called upon me to fill in for him at Greystone Mansion. It was of course delightful.

Another year one of the San Diego boats had an experimental kayak and skiff trip to San Clemente. As the trip was ending, somehow it got around that I was taking my reels to Michael. By the time I left the boat I had a duffel bag with 20 reels from various people I had never seen before to deliver to Michael for his expert care and handling.

One of the delights of Michael being so near where I worked was that I could on occasion run up to his house, drop off a reel, and have a very pleasant conversation over a glass of wine as Michael performed his reel magic. He will be missed.

## *A Plan to Harness the Wind*

The federal government plans to open more than 250,000 acres off the California coast to **wind power development**. The Biden administration announced the proposal as part of a significant effort to increase the nation's renewable energy and cut its climate-warming emissions.

Under the plan, the administration would allow construction of wind power projects in federal waters off Central California northwest of Morro Bay and a second location west of Humboldt Bay. Officials estimate that the two areas combined could generate **4,600 megawatts** of electricity — enough to power **1.6 million homes**.

**Gov. Gavin Newsom** praised the plans, noting that California spent years trying to advance offshore wind under the Trump administration, with no success. He said the state will accelerate its environmental review process to speed up the projects, which he estimated would be built at least 20 miles offshore with enough space for roughly 380 wind turbines.

The announcement comes amid a surge of interest in offshore wind power, though previous efforts have been

hampered. Primary concerns include regulatory obstacles, engineering challenges created by the Pacific Ocean floor's steep drop-off, and concerns about the infrastructure's impact on migratory birds, marine life and fisheries.

But energy experts say there's little question that we will eventually need offshore wind — it's just a matter of how much and how soon.
