# A Message from the President

## LONG RANGE FISHING AFTERGLOW

I am still basking in the afterglow of my five-day trip on the Red Rooster. This is the first Larry Brown sponsored trip I have been on. Together with fellow LARRC members Phil Bell and Randy Sharon we left H&M landing for Guadalupe Island around noon on August 31st. First stop was the check in, fee payment, and registration with the Mexican authorities required in Ensenada. We left Ensenada in the late afternoon and travelled south all night.



The following morning was devoted to setting up our tackle. Larry kindly tutored me in the fine art of tying totally reliable San Diego jam knots and flourocarbon-braid connections and adjusted the drag of my reels. Larry also conducted the trip raffle. Everyone had the chance to pick several items from cabin tables covered with hats, shirts, jigs, and assorted terminal tackle. This was followed by a drawing for a top reel and a top rod. This raffle generated \$2750 to support LARRC's veterans fishing trips!

The boat arrived at the northern point of Guadalupe in the mid-day. The Royal Star was further south and reported a good bite along with lots of enthusiastic shark standbys. Captain Andy cruised past a bay that had lots of fish markings and decided to turn around and stop. This bay had a name – H.P. for honeypot. We encountered a steady bite of yellowfins, as well as sporadic action from nice yellowtails, all afternoon with only a sparse showing of sharks.

Larry had advised me to be sure to bring my best heavy stuff as the yellowfins of Guadalupe are “brutal.” He was

right. A hookup meant becoming attached to a diesel locomotive with attitude. My first tuna took me completely around the boat twice – a record for me. The fish were sassy and heavy and often required two gaffs.


For the next three days we fished in and around the H.P. The sharks showed up the next day and were a nuisance but with the assistance of the crew we managed to land around 70% of the hooked fish. I lost one tuna who made the mistake of doing a pole dance with the anchor line. Rather than breaking off, he was munched. We woke up at three thirty a.m. each night to use Sabiki rigs to fill our bait tanks with the abundant mackerel and other bait fished that cruised the bay – this was no vacation for slouches.

I ended up landing four YFT's from 66 to 92 pounds and 9 yellowtails from 12 to 29 pounds. The 92-pound YFT and 29-pound yellowtail were personal bests for me. There were 17 personal bests on the boat. The jackpot went to a 118-pound YFT. The indefatigable Randy Sharon scored the fourth heaviest fish and was fitted for a deluxe Red Rooster jacket after the return to the dock.

This fishing bonanza would not have happened without the exceptional stewardship, coaching, and encouragement of the crew of the Red Rooster 3. They were amazing at unwrapping crossed lines, guiding anxious fisherman down a hot rail, untying gnarly tangles, retying terminal tackle during a hot bite, shepherding tuna around the nefarious anchor line at the bow, and gaffing the fish. Chef Mike and Skyler served exceptional food throughout the journey. An afternoon spread of fresh caught YFT and yellowtail sushi, sashimi, and poke was not just great – it was a work of art!

We are blessed to have this unique live bait fishery in Southern California and Mexican waters.



# GUADALUPIN' ON THE RED ROOSTER 3

**Guadalupin'** (def. 1. Fishing at Guadalupe Island on the RR3

1. Having a great time with LARRC anglers on the RR3
2. Catching yellowfin tuna and yellowtail
3. Losing 30% of our hooked fish to amazing Great White sharks.)

On August 31, six LARRC members including Ted Feit, Randy Sharon, Fisherman Phil Bell, Larry Brown, Norin and Nona Grancell embarked on a Larry Brown 5 day Guadalupin' angling adventure to Guadalupe Island aboard the Red Rooster 3. There were 24 total anglers on the boat. Each angler paid an extra \$540 for a permit to fish Guadalupe. Every person passed a Covid test before they boarded the boat.

We left the dock in San Diego at 12:30, cleared customs and permits in Ensenada at 5:30 PM and arrived at Guadalupe Island at 12:30 PM the following day. As soon as we arrived, big tuna were everywhere.

We fished this amazing island for 3 straight days and caught yellowfin from 65 to 118 lbs. and yellowtail from 15 to 30 lbs. Fly lining 60 to 80 lb. test using sardines on a 1/0 or 2/0 hooks was the preferred setup. Selecting the perfect bait that would make a strong run away from the boat was almost guaranteed to provoke a strike.

At the end of the second day and most of the third day the major challenge to catching fish were the Great White Sharks. After hooking and fighting a yellowfin for 20 to 60 minutes, a 15 to 20 foot Great White would devour the tuna within 10 feet of the boat. The visuals of these awesome sharks thrashing on top of the water to eat your tuna were quite dramatic. We were very fortunate that the first day and most of the second days was shark free.



Every LARRC angler caught plenty of fish for family and friends of these trophies of 80 to 110 lb. yellowfin and 15 to 25 lb. yellowtail. The jackpot, a 118.9 lb. yellowfin, was caught by Mark DeBello. LARRC 36 year member Randy Sharon won a beautiful RR3 jacket and medallion for the fourth largest yellowfin at 113.4 Lbs. 15 anglers caught their personal best yellowfin tuna. Total count for the boat : 91 yellowfin tuna 65 to 118 lbs and 101 yellowtail 15 to 30 lbs.

The Larry Brown raffle raised \$2,750 for Veteran fishing trips. There were some great raffle items including an Avet reel, Phenix rod and Body Glove wetsuit.

Norin and Nona conducted a burial at sea for Norin's

101 year old Uncle Albert. Norin spread Albert's ashes on the water. Nona, Chris and Fisherman Phil sang Amazing Grace. Phil recited the Mourner's Kaddesh. Then flowers were floated on the sea to conclude the service.

Captain Andy Cates and deckhands Jason, Justin, Kevin, and Ethan were totally dedicated to insuring that we had a great angling experience. Chef Mike and sous chef Skyler served up gourmet meals every night including prime rib, and steak and scallops. Chef Mike also made an incredible sushi/sashimi creation by arranging the fish on the skeleton of a yellowtail in lieu of a platter.

# FISHING THE LEX SEA

Allen Brodetsky and I had a charter fishing trip with Christian Sekas aboard the “Lex Sea” out of Dana Point Sport-fishing on September 17th. The Lex Sea is a 26 foot boat that takes up to four people. Christian is an excellent skipper, a great guy to be with, and he has a real knack for catching fish. I fished with Christian earlier in the year and we had excellent fishing for yellowtail at San Clemente Island. On that previous trip, we left about 5:00 a.m. and arrived at the Island a few hours later.

Allen contacted me before the September 17th trip and told me that the plans were going to be different than our previous trip. A week before our September 17th trip, Allen and a friend were out with Christian and they got four bluefin tuna from 140 - 240 lbs - amazing! The bluefin were at the Tanner Bank - about 100 miles from the landing. As a result, we would need to leave the night before at about 5:00 p.m., go to San Clemente Island, sleep in a sheltered cove at the Island, and then go to the Tanner Bank in the morning. Allen told me to leave all of my fishing gear at home. The boat had all of the big gear that we needed - and we would only target big fish.

Allen knew that my number one “bucket list” fish is a bluefin over 100 lbs. I have caught several 90-95 lb bluefin - but none over 100. Quite frankly, I was a

little hesitant to make such a long run on that boat, but my wife Helayne told me “you gotta go”. I’m glad that I took her advice.

Christian was very optimistic that we would get some big bluefin. We arrived at the Tanner Bank early in the morning, marked some big schools in the dark and tried to get them on the flat falls. No biters. When it got light, we started to fish with dead flying fish with a kite and balloon. Allen got a bite later in the morning - and the hook came out of the fish. No other bites for the next several hours. About noon, we started marking more and more big schools of fish. Christian put out a plastic flying fish with a balloon and a kite - and within a few seconds, a huge boil on our line. I fought the fish for about an hour and finally got my “bucket list” fish. Unbelievably strong fish! Christian was on the cover of Western Outdoor News from the trip with Allen from the previous trip - with two big fish - the biggest of which was 240 lbs. The fish that I caught was longer and bigger than that fish - and we estimated it about 250 lbs - the biggest fish ever caught on the Lex Sea, my biggest tuna - and one that I will never forget.

# Guadalupe Island - The Agony and the Ecstasy

Our mid August, 6-day charter on the Red Rooster iii was spectacular. We arrived at Jurassic Guadalupe Island to perfect weather and conditions; flat calm seas, a strong current, and a warm 5 knot wind. The tuna immediately responded to our chum. Hundred plus pound tuna were boiling and within minutes we had one, then two, then 3 going. We landed about 6 before the great white sharks showed up and began collecting their taxes.

I love Guadalupe Island. The topography, the ancient volcanic cones and sedimentary rock formations, the rugged beauty and of course the great white sharks are truly awe inspiring. The fishing can be darn good too, and we were blessed with the best hooking I'd ever seen or experienced at this heavenly rock. Everybody got plenty of opportunities. Bites were plentiful but the appetites of these apex predators is as stunning as their beauty and majesty. I think we lost 3 out of four tuna. They were straight hundred pound tuna but a mere hors d'oeuvre for these giant sharks

So I love Guadalupe - I also love sharks. But at one point my love was seriously tested. So was my mental strength and character. After landing one gorgeous 100 plus pound tuna I proceeded to lose 7 IN A ROW to the representatives of the Guadalupe IRS Tax authorities. Love turns to hate rapidly. I was beside myself. I felt myself sinking into the mental abyss. I questioned my skill; I questioned why on Earth any sane person would subject themselves to this torture. But I kept doing the same thing thinking, hoping and praying for different results. Temporary Insanity? This is the Agony and the Ecstasy of Guadalupe Island. During this painful few hours I also lost 3 more fish due to hooks pulling and a break in my spectra. But my luck turned around and I ended day one with 3 beauties. On day one I scored two "personal bests," one for most 100lb tuna "hooked" in a single day (13) and the other for most 100lb tuna lost to sharks in a single day.

Day 2 was much better for me landing 8, hook and handing 2 and giving a couple away. Life was good once again and my love affair with the Island and it's local great white residents is firmly reestablished. Everybody had a great time and caught a ton of fish. We are all looking forward to returning next year.

We also had a very successful raffle for our fishing programs for disabled veterans. Someone asked me what the record raffle was and I said it was on our June Royal Star trip, where Joel Steinman was being honored as our LARRC Hero

and returned \$3,400 to the LARRC Foundation. I said that record would likely stand for a very long time and flippantly said I'd personally match it if we broke the record on this trip. Be careful what you say and ask for! My dearest friends then rallied the troops and kept increasing the ante until I was on the hook for matching \$3,850. Thanks to our very generous and slightly evil anglers LARRC Foundation is receiving \$7,700 for our veterans fishing program from this trip. Thanks LARRC for taking our veterans fishing and thanks to all of our generous sponsors and anglers for your interest and support. You are awesome.

We convinced our friends Jon, Debbie, Jim and Mike to join us in August for the week. The trip consisted of 5 days




of fishing (either ocean or river), meals and lodging. The lodge only hosts 12 guests a week and we were lucky to have

We arrived on Sunday just in time for cocktail hour and to meet the other 6 people. The cabins were huge and had 2 king beds, fireplace and wet bar. The view from all the cabins and main lodge is spectacular. All the windows and sliding doors face the Cook Inlet and the volcanoes. It was beautiful.

Monday was our first day of fishing on the ocean with Steve on the Megalodon. We drove the boat to the beach and a giant tractor hooked up to the boat trailer and launched the boat for us. We were on the boat watching and it was super cool to experience. Our foursome was Kevin, Mike, Jim and myself. We targeted lingcod and oh we were stoked! We got several big ones and Jim was hot stick with a 100lb halibut and a giant lingcod. Jon and Debbie went river fishing and flossed for sockeye salmon! They had an incredible day with Jon catching 14 of them.

Tuesday was well, life changing. The lodge offers helicopter rides to the Volcanoes and glacier fields and river fishing for salmon and ending the day with fresh fish, drinks and fun along the edge of a glacial lake. I can't even begin to explain how amazing it was and just thank-





ful for everything to be able to experience that day. The pictures don't do it any justice but it was a humbling and magnificent day. Oh yeah we caught some salmon in this little river and saw bear prints!

Wednesday, Mike and Jim went ocean fishing for halibut and Kevin, Jon and I went river fishing. We launched from Tustumena Lake. There is no fishing in

the lake to protect the juvenile salmon and the spawn. So we drift boated down river to a neat little beach and set up for the day. We learned how to "Floss" which uses a 10ft fly rod and you stand with the river on your right side facing downstream. You cast to the river and bring your right arm towards shore for a 3 count then set the hook sideways to-




wards shore. So the idea is the salmon are swimming up stream and their mouths are open and you hope to run the hooks through their open mouths. It was a fun and interesting day. I caught a nice silver and Sky (our guide) said it was the first time in his 25 years of someone flossing a silver!! Well we ate that beauty for lunch and it was delicious!



Thursday, Mike and Jim went river fishing with 2 others from the other group, Jon and Debbie went to Homer and Kevin and I went ocean fishing with 2 others from the other group. We had a blast with our Captain Josh on the Kraken and we showed Kim and Joel how to bottom fish for black rock fish since they have never done this fishing before!

Friday, Jim went to Homer, Jon and Debbie hungout and Mike, Kevin and I went on the Kraken again with Josh. Our goal for the day was halibut and man we got them!!! We had a fantastic day fishing and amazing weather.


So that covers the fishing part. The hospitality and meals I can't
