This is a fantastic for families as it allows people of all ages and skill levels to partake in the adventure.


When it comes to sport fishing, Crystal River has it all and Captain Clay Shidler knows how to provide you and

BOB SELVIN SPEAKS AT APRIL MEETING

Thanks to the expertise and work of Scott Schiffman and Mike Hartt, the April LARRC meeting was both in person at Lulu's restaurant and available for remote attendance on Zoom. Past LARRC president Bob Selvin was able to attend and tell us about two of his most notable catches. While on the Apollo July 20, 1999, Bob hooked and landed a 151 lb. 3 oz. bluefin tuna. Three gaffs were required to land the fish. He landed the fish using straight 40 lb. mono and a Penn Senator 4/0 reel. This was before the advent of braid, flourocarbon, and fancy 2 or 3 speed reels. Randy Sharon, who was on the boat, said it was one of the best catches he had ever seen! This is high praise indeed. Bob also showed us pictures of the 10 lb. 10 oz. mega lunker calico bass he nabbed on September 17, 2003 at the Sacramento Reef.

ENVIRONMENTAL MATTERS

◆ **An Abundance of Herring in the Salish Sea, Links to Chinook and Coho Growth** - You all know that I was a proponent of protecting forage fish as a key to building a healthy, resilient ocean ecosystem before. Well, new research through Long Live the Kings and the Pacific Salmon Foundation uncovered trends that show, in essence, having more herring to feed on gives fish a greater chance to survive their journey to the ocean and their eventual return. ◆ **Seagrasses Can Help Clean the Water Marine Life.** - One of the requirements of our Federal fisheries management law is to protect essential fish habitat. But, the definition is narrow to look holistically at what ocean characteristics lead to successful, healthy fish populations. For example, a recent study shows seagrasses reduces pathogens including gastroenteritis-causing Enterococcus bacteria. But, seagrasses can also help clean the water for other marine species, including those harvested as seafood. <https://hakaimagazine.com/news/the-surprising-scale-of-the-seagrass-sanitation-service/>

◆ **Eelgrass Beds Are Important for Resilience of Fish Stocks**- It seems seagrasses and eelgrass do more than just wrap around your prop. A new study from UiA shows that a network of eelgrass beds is important for maintaining the genetic diversity of fish stocks, and thereby making them more resilient against changes in the environment, like climate change. If the distance between eelgrass areas becomes too large for organisms to cross, local fish stocks will not exchange individuals or genes. The stocks thus become less resilient to overfishing and environmental changes. <https://thefishing-wire.com/eelgrass-beds-are-important-for-resilience-of-fish-stocks/>

◆ **Oregon's Intertidal Ecosystem is Approaching a Tipping Point. Is California's?** - Slowing recovery times and reduced ecosystem stability suggest that as climate change brings more frequent disturbances to intertidal ecosystems, local species may struggle to recuperate in increasingly brief windows for recovery. In their place, other species, ones better suited to dealing with heat stress or acidity, can swoop in. As key species such as mussels, sea stars, or kelp are lost, and as the balance between disturbances and recovery time changes, the ecosystem can shift irreversibly. ◆ **NOAA Fisheries Devised New Tool For Monitoring Movement of Marine Fish** - Are you wondering if you've lost your touch or if the fish just aren't where they used to be? ◆ **Should We Remove Retired Oil Rigs or Repurpose Them?** - That enduring question was the topic of the recent Orange County Coastkeeper seminar reported by Merit McCrea in the April edition of Western Outdoor News. "These gigantic towers placed on featureless seafloor form vibrant oases of marine life in miles of mud." While science shows these platforms provide productive marine habitat, other advocate for full removal following the polluter pays philosophy.

Hay Carumba, May Day - May Day

I want to go fishing so badly I can taste it. Bluefin tuna are biting everything

The San Diego Bluefin tuna season started out with a bang this year. Fast and furious may be a better description. The very first trip out of the gate (normally exploratory) was team Polaris Supreme, just finished with major boat work. They experienced EXCELLENT fishing day and night on BFT 60 - 180 lbs on bait and jigs on their 3-day trip. Their next trip was a 1.5-day voyage with more BFT limits plus good scores of yellowtail. Then the overnight fleet got busy sending out several boats on 1.5-day missions, with everybody returning with full limits. This was all in the last week of March. Some of the boats had full limits before sunrise and were "forced" to hunt for other species.

This continued all through April with the best BFT fishing I have seen, EVER. Trip after trip after trip reported limits, limits, limits.

I'm thinking the only reason no BFT were being reported in January and February is NOBODY WAS FISHING FOR THEM. Remember, I had two December charters where we caught full limits, easily. The Mexican Seiner Fleet caught their annual quotas in the first couple weeks of ef-

fort in January. And as soon as the recreational fleet started targeting them the fish reports were exciting and boring, with limits, limit, limits reported trip after trip. I think this demonstrates the Eastern Pacific Bluefin Tuna is a year round fishery if there are boats willing to target them during the traditional off months.

The fish were biting live baits and jigs day and night. Despite the warnings and advisories some anglers came unprepared or under gunned and did not have the 100 - 130# outfits to tackle the giants which were occasionally in the mix. Listen to the advisories and borrow or invest in a big game outfit. Your reel needs perfect free spool so your jig descends unimpaired. I use an Avet 50 3-Speed and a Phenix 8ft 3X rod, but all the new high tech gear will get the job done.

In the old days anglers would wait until the first big scores to book their trips. This year guys scrambled to get a reservation on a long-range boat (3 days or more) and found nearly every trip for the year was SOLD OUT. That's OK, there is plenty of availability on the overnight and 1.5 day fleet, but they will sell out fast too.



Day one was a non-starter as 20 to 30 knot winds kept all boats on their trailers. Day 2 started the same, but with winds forecast to lessen in the afternoon, guide Steve Hillman decided to give it a go. Wading in waist deep bay water was a pleasant experience compared to rock strewn moving river water. The only exception was when you stepped into a hole and dropped to chest high water lapping over your waders. Cast after cast using 3-inch paddle tail swim baits went for naught for both the guide and me. Finally as the sun was going down, a beauty of a speckled trout decided to eat my lure. The 23 inch 4 pound fish put up a respectable fight and was released to give another angler a chance to fool it. All in all it was a fishing not catching day, but that was OK with me. The new experience of bay wading was worth the trip.

Caught a few small wild Rainbows and Browns in Rock Creek that had the par marks of the CA Golden Trout. The Golden must have lived in that creek at one time, and left a little of their DNA. All in all it was a great trip and a welcome get away from the hustle and bustle of city life. Enjoy the photos.
